

# Addresses Must Be Correct On Registration Forms

## Hibshman Emphasizes Accuracy Importance

Just how important it is that the three addresses are correct which will be required on the registration blanks that more than 2,000 18-20 students will sign when registering for Selective Service in the Armory, on Tuesday, was pointed out by Edward K. Hibshman, executive secretary of the alumni and chairman of the College draft committee, yesterday.

Mr. Hibshman stated that one address will govern the local draft board to which students' registrations will be sent and another will be the address to which all official mail for the registrant is sent by the local board. The third should be the address of a person who will always know where the registrant is located.

An error on the first address will cause untold confusion, said Mr. Hibshman. If this is incorrect, the registration cards will be mailed to the wrong board with the consequence that students will be governed by a draft board other than the one for their neighborhood.

The mailing address can either be the home or College address of the student. It is up to the individuals as to where they desire their draft mail to be sent. Any address changes following registration should be immediately referred to respective local draft committees.

Although the Armory will be open officially from 7 a. m. till 9 p. m., the draft committee has requested that students report during the hours scheduled for them on the registrant schedule. This will facilitate mass signing up and eliminate confusion. Registrants will be automatically excused from classes scheduled for the hour at which they have been assigned to appear in the Armory.

Before registering, students should obtain a sample registration form now available at Student Union. This form which should be filled out on a typewriter, will be kept by the College draft committee. Matriculation cards will also be required for identification.

## NASSP Conducts College Workshop

For the third consecutive semester, the College Summer Workshop will be conducted under the auspices of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

The six weeks courses given by that unit are designed to give secondary school teachers an opportunity to obtain additional university credits. Matriculation in one of the cooperating institutions, the University of Pittsburgh, the University of Pennsylvania, or The Pennsylvania State College permits them to take the desired courses without interfering with Winter teaching schedules.

Prominent high school principals, representatives from the Educational Policies Commission, from the United States Office of Education, from the Office of Civilian Defense, and from the National Citizenship Commission are among the persons serving as consultants during the Summer.

The workshop will follow a schedule similar to that of other years. Special problems will be discussed, unusual exhibits will be on hand, and a well-rounded

## French Institute Opens 13th Year

Working under an honor bound policy of "no English," a selected group of 25 to 30 students and teachers of the French language will open the thirteenth year of Penn State's Summer French Institute on June 29, according to Professor Francis M. du Mont, secretary of the Institute.

The purpose of the six week course is to provide for the students a true French atmosphere in which they can pick up fluency of conversation and accuracy of pronunciation. The members pledge themselves to use nothing but French in all normal daily activities. Meals and other group functions are to be the special training grounds for acquiring increased fluency.

The Institute has been in existence since 1927 and under its present director, Prof. Frederick Ernst, of NYU, since 1929.

Activities, meals and probably all classes will center in Locust Lane Lodge, 312 Locust Lane.

## Rothschild String Quartet Will Give Concert Next Month

Internationally famous Rothschild String Quartet, under the leadership of Fritz Rothschild, will appear in Schwab Auditorium on July 9, under the auspices of the Summer Sessions Office as part of its recreation and entertainment program; it was announced recently.

Mr. Rothschild, famed violinist, has given concerts throughout Europe with the European Quartet, a quartet that has been lauded by foreign music critics for being a beautifully-balanced ensemble.

Later coming to the United States, Mr. Rothschild formed his present quartet which includes Christine Phillipson, second violinist, who was formerly associated with the National and Columbia Broadcasting Companies and appeared as soloist with the N.B.C. orchestra; Lillian Renberg, cellist, who has toured extensively in the East and Middle West; and Eugenis Limberg, who plays the viola and was a soloist for the Chicago, Cincinnati, and New York symphony orchestras.

Originator of one part missing ensemble records, Mr. Rothschild and his group have made almost 100 "Add-a-Part" records and certs which has gained the praise of American music critics.

The concert, one of a number of similar concerts expected to be given by the Band, Orchestra and Chorus School of the Summer sessions, will be open to all students free of charge.
