

Panhel Changes Rushing Code To Further Administration

Greeks To Hold Daytime Formals

To clarify Panhellenic rushing code and to make its administration more convenient for both sorority women and rushees, the Council ruled several code changes at last night's meeting.

Panhellenic members voted to set the time for two-hour informal parties between 6:30 and 9 p. m. Houses may schedule two parties from July 13 to July 17, as stated in the code.

A motion was passed permitting sororities to hold informal parties and formal coffee hours in town if they so desired.

An individual house poll found the Council unanimously in favor of changing the time for the formal coffee hours from Saturday night, July 18, to Saturday afternoon, thus permitting Greeks and rushees to attend dinner. The new ruling specifies that two formal coffee hours may be scheduled by sororities from 2 to 3:30 p. m. and from 3:45 to 5:15 p. m.

Because of this change, invitations for formal parties must be delivered by 10 p. m. Thursday, July 16, and freshmen and transfers are to reply with written answers delivered to Student Union by 5 p. m. Friday, July 17. Sororities are requested to have bids in the dean of women's office by 7:30 p. m. Saturday, July 18, according to Pauline E. Keller '43, Panhellenic president.

Last silent periods will range from 9 p. m. Thursday, July 16, to 2 p. m. Saturday, July 18, and from 5:15 p. m. Saturday, July 18, to the time bids are accepted Sunday, July 19.

Because of a misinterpretation of the code's ruling on alumnae participation in rushing, Miss Keller clarified the law for the benefit of all houses. Alumnae living in town are under the same restrictions as undergraduate students, she said, but are permitted to attend open houses and parties.

All members of sororities enrolled in Summer semester or Summer sessions may assist with rushing according to the Panhellenic code, she continued. Greeks living in town or visiting on campus who are not enrolled in the College may not participate in rushing or attend parties or open houses, she said.

Appointments made by the Council executive committee last night include social committee—Betty Jane Haupt '43, chairman, Natalie A. Siebert '43, and Sally L. Hirshberg '44; Panhellenic representatives for Victory Weekend—Marjorie R. Chambers '43, Lila A. Whoolery '43, and Anne M. Serocca '44.

Swenson Clarifies Women's Swimming Hours, Admittance

Plunge hours and requirements for women's admittance to White Hall Pool and Glennland Pool for the Summer have been announced by Miss Helen J. Swenson, instructor in physical education.

Regular Summer semester students may swim in White Hall pool Tuesday—7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Wednesday—4 to 5:30 p. m.; Thursday—WRA Swimming Club meeting at 7:30 p. m.; Friday—3 to 5:30 p. m. and 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Saturday—2:30 to 4:30 p. m. and 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Sunday—2:30 to 4:30 p. m. Swimmers need bring only a bathing cap. Miss Swenson stated.

Requirements for Summer session students include a full time standing and medical examination at the College Dispensary. They must also secure a ticket for towel, lock, and tank suit. Tickets may be bought at the Bursar's office, Old Main, for two dollars. One dollar will be refunded at the end of the Summer.

Plunge hours for Summer session students are Monday—7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Tuesday—4 to 5:30 p. m.; Wednesday—7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Thursday—3 to 5:30 p. m.; Friday—3 to 5:30 p. m. and 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Saturday—2:30 to 4:30 p. m. and 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Sunday—2:30 to 4:30 p. m.

Mixed swimming at Glennland Pool will be 7 to 10 p. m. Tuesdays and Fridays, and 1 to 5 p. m. and 7 to 10 p. m. Saturdays. Summer session students may use the White Hall ticket, and regular Summer semester students may secure permits at Miss Haid's office in White Hall at no cost, to swim in the Glennland Pool.

WRA Swimming Club has taken over the lifesaving classes which will meet for 17 hours during the next six weeks, Miss Swenson announced. There will be two one and one-half hour periods a week.

First meeting of the class was held last evening, but all Summer semester students and those Summer session students who meet requirements for admittance to plunge hours may come to the first class at 8:30 p. m. tomorrow, according to Miss Swenson. Students must be at least 17 years old to enter the life saving class.
