Riding Club To Give Special Summer Session Lessons

"A special set of instructions will be given to Summer session students who are interested in horseback riding," stated Eugene S. Stull '43, president of the Penn State Riding Club.

The change to this plan, according to Mr. Stull, is a radical one in comparison to those of previous years. Formerly, only Summer session students who could already ride were allowed to join the club, but the new special instruction plan will enable the beginner to try his hand at mastering a horse.

An organization meeting will be held at the Stock Judging Pavilion at 7 p. m. tonight, when the activities of the club will be discussed and an exhibition put on for those present.

The riding club, with Dr. Henry L. Yeagley as sponsor and Ray M. Conger as financial advisor, has been successful in keeping the cost of membership stationary, despite the increase in cost of feed and horses. The Summer fee, which is \$5 for membership and \$10 for the riding charge, is the same as that of preceding semesters.

With the acquisition of a stable located 200 yards east of Atherton Hall and the opening of numerous new trails leading far into the surrounding country, riding for the members has become more convenient, pleasurable, safer. A riding ring has recently been made within the stable grounds, with the possibility of a white fence being made to enclose it.

Eight Men To Make Cornell Trip Tomorrow

With its only meet of the Summer season scheduled to take place in Ithaca Saturday, a skeleton Lion track team is rounding into mid-season form preparing to meet teams from Colgate, Cornell, and Syracuse in a July 4th Army-Navy Relief meet.

The eight-man team will leave tomorrow to travel north for the special meet. They will compete in six events, a mile run, a half-mile run, a 440-yard run, 120-yard high hurdles, a special 600-yard invitation run, and a medley relay.

The team will be composed of Barney Plessner, Marty Schiff, Mac Smith, Bob Jones, Ed Young, Cliff St. Clair, Gerry Karver, and Bill Shuman. Only three of the men have taken part in varsity competition previous to this meet. Jones and Young, upperclassmen, have not competed before while the other three were members of this Spring's frosh team and last Winter's freshman indoor squad.

Karver and St. Clair have been asked to compete in the special 600-yard run. Coach Chick Werner said yesterday he did not yet know which one would run or whether both would run. He said the decision of the meet would not be made until the day

Karver will be one of the key men in the mile as he tries for his first varsity title. Holder of the College freshman mile record, Karver stands out as having possibilities of becoming one of the greatest milers in the day's mile run should go some country. The Lion medley relay team will be made up of Schiff, Jones, Shuman, and Karver.

Other individual competition will be Plessner and Young in the high hurdles, Smith in the half-mile, and Shuman in the 440.
