With more and more women going into war industries, greater interest is being shown in women's trade unions and in the history of women who started out working for legislation, and economic and political improvement.

In 1939 about 173,000, or practically one-fifth of all the workers in the Federal service were women. Clerical occupations, such as typist, stenographer, or statistical clerk, were in the majority. Next to stenographers; nurses account for more women in the Government service than any other occupation.

Specialized knowledge or experience, such as that of statisticians, accountants, librarians. economists, social welfare workers, teachers, writers or editors, bers come around with defense research workers in many fields, scientists, and laboratory techni-


