

Tuleya Hurls 3-1 Comeback Win Over Colgate Baseballers

Lion Golfers Defeat Colgate, 7-2

Matching the Colgate boys hole for hole in the early part of the meet, the Lion golfers crept ahead on the links yesterday to beat the Red Raiders 7-2, in a close match on the College course.

Dick Stephens, co-captain, met and defeated Burke from Colgate in one of the tight matches of the afternoon, one down. Whether the home course has anything to do with this pair's playing still remains to be seen since the game yesterday was so close.

Bill Swan, the other co-captain, turned in a 71 to match Vogle from Colgate, beating his man, Loss, one up. Penn State won best ball. The players in the first foursome had tough going, and defeated the Raiders only on the last hole.

Dick Hastings won from Fox, Colgate, one down, while Fairchild lost to Hamilton, one down. Colgate took best ball, Chuck MacLay turned in medal score for the meet, a 70, just one over par for the course. He defeated Vogle, two and one.

MacLay's partner, Jim McCormack, knocked off Charles Fenback of Colgate, three and two. Penn State won best ball.

In spite of the large margin in the score, the Nittany linksmen had no easy time putting away the men from Colgate, some of the matches being won on the last hole. Fairchild, the only Penn State man to lose his match, turned in a 73, while his opponent did the course in 75. Losing best ball here gave Colgate the second point.

Colgate and Penn State will tangle again this afternoon on the College course in the second match this weekend. The same line-up will tee off for Penn State as entered the meet yesterday.

The win yesterday makes the fifth straight for the Lion golfers this Summer. If the Lions win the next two meets scheduled for the Summer, they will have completed two schedules without a single loss. Only blot on the golfers' record is the loss of the meet for the EIGA championship in May to Yale.

2nd Battle Carded Here This Afternoon

Hurling for the first time in nearly three months, Eddie Tuleya, senior southpaw, staged a successful comeback as he pitched the Lion baseball team to a four-hit, 3 to 1 win over Colgate here yesterday. The two teams will battle again on the New Beaver field diamond at 2:30 p. m. today.

For four innings Coach Joe Bendek's boys were unable to get a hit past the infield, and trailed 1-0 at the end of the fifth frame. Two tallies in the sixth pushed Penn State ahead, 2-1, and another in the eighth helped clinch the victory.

Eddie Tuleya's last game as a pitcher was May 1, against West Virginia. Soon after that he strained a thigh muscle and couldn't perform on the mound until yesterday, although he saw service in nearly every game as an outfielder. The York lad fanned eight Red Raiders, issuing seven free passes, while Colgate's Carl Heidel struck out nine and walked six.

Big guns for the Nittany nine were Captain Bill Debler, first baseman, and Whitey Thomas, shortstop. Thomas played one of the most brilliant games of his career as he made several thrilling plays.

Penn State's varsity tennis team made a valiant battle of it for nearly four grueling hours yesterday, but were finally downed by a stronger Colgate University court squad by a 5 1/2-3 1/2 score on the college courts.

The loss was their third since the beginning of the Summer season, and their second at the hands of the Red Raiders. The Lions will wind up their series with the New Yorkers when they meet for the last time on the college courts at 2 p. m. today.

In yesterday's match Cy Hull, Penn State's number one player, was halted by Kendall of Colgate, 6-4, 6-4. Bill Lundelius continued his winning form by trouncing Frick of Colgate in straight sets, 6-4, 6-0.

Dan Moses fell before the unerring slants of Colgate's Martin, 6-0, 6-0, and Dick Armbrust was defeated by Harkins, 6-3, 6-1. Jim Lawther put Penn State back in the running by outlasting Waterhouse of Colgate in a close three-set match, 6-3, 7-9, 6-3.

In the other singles match, Herb Kraybill dropped a close decision in the longest match of the afternoon to Babcock, 6-8, 8-6, 3-6.

In the doubles Hull and Lundelius teamed to stop Kendall and Martin of Colgate in straight sets, 6-3, 7-5. Harkins and Weber of Colgate took the next match by edging Lawther and Jack Weber 6-3, 7-5.

With the match between Kraybill and Armbrust, of State, and Frick and Babcock knotted at one set each, the contest was called, and each team was awarded a half point, making the final score 5 1/2-3 1/2 in favor of Colgate.
