

Frosh-Soph 'Tug Of War' To Decide Custom Removal

Freshman coeds will battle in a tug of war to lose customs following the annual men's contest during the Victory Weekend Field Day at 2 p. m. Saturday, it was decided at a meeting of WSGA Senate last night.

With a recommendation from WSGA Judicial Committee, Senate voted to give the coeds permission to remove ribbons, name-cards, and customs of holding doors open and stepping on the grass, if they are successful in winning the "tug."

Marjorie L. Sykes '43, Judicial chairman, announced that each freshman coed is responsible for bringing one sophomore woman, and that as a team, the frosh should gather beneath the score board on New Beaver Field during the male tug of war.

Capt. William B. Dennis Jr., campus patrol, will judge contestants, who will battle in bare feet, according to Miss Sykes.

Julia H. McFarland '45 has been appointed captain of the sophomore team and Helen Martin, freshman senator, will direct the underdogs to victory. "If the freshmen fail to pull the sophomores across the designated line, Senate will set a later date for the removal of customs," Miss Sykes stated. "Winning the contest will mean immediate freedom from those special customs," she added.

Dating customs will continue until move-up day which Senate will set later, according to the report made by the Judicial Committee.

WSGA House Polls Coed Preference In Defense Credit

Results of a defense course evaluation poll of sophomore, junior, and senior women taken last week by WSGA House of Representatives, show that the majority of those contacted favored giving one College credit to all coeds satisfactorily completing one of the College-sponsored defense courses.

One group emphasized that all coeds should be compelled to take one of these courses regardless of credit. Majority, however, supported the non-compulsory plan.

At a House meeting yesterday, members agreed unanimously that courses be continued next semester, announced Dorothy K. Brunner '44, speaker. Several members suggested that more detailed description of each course be included in the Defense Catalogue.

Recommended for benefit of next Fall's freshman class, the House recommended that defense courses be given in place of several required orientation courses.

Suggested additions to the course repertoire are a machine shop course and one training coeds in the operation of farm machinery.

Miss Brunner appointed Louise W. Henry '44 to investigate possibilities of securing a service flag to be flown in front of Old Main.

"Mimeographed copies of a map of picnic grounds surrounding State College will be distributed this week to women's dormitories and sororities," Miss Brunner said.

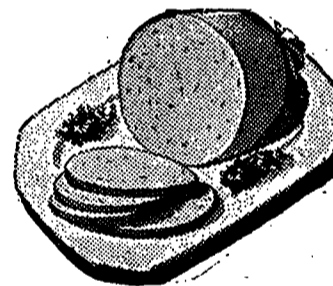

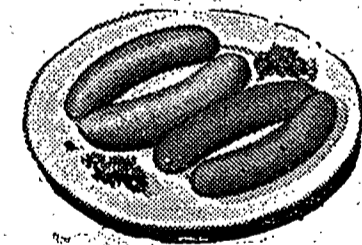
