WSGA presented \$75 "Victory Awards" to Jane M. Parkhill '43, Grace E. Sammons '44, Alice R. Fox '45, and Rose D. Devecka '46 at the Dantz-a-poppin program Saturday night. Margaret K. Sherman '43, WSGA president, made the presentations.

Chosen on the basis of scholarship, contribution to the College, and need, one coed from each class received an award, given as WSGA's contribution to Victory Weekend. Money used was that formerly given as a Co-Edition subsidy.

A member of Pi Lambda Theta, national women's education honorary, Miss Parkhill was on La Vie junior board, IWA Council, and belongs to the Modern Dance production group. She was a senior sponsor and is active in the PSCA.
