Seven varsity lettermen were among the group that met with Coaches Higgins, Earl Edwards, Al Michaels, and Marty McAndrews for the conditioning drills. Palazzi, center; Van Lenten, end; Perugini and Jaffurs, guards; Kerns and Schoonover, tackles; Sparky Brown and Aldo Cenci, backs, reported for the 7 p. m. sessions.

Among the numeral winners back from last year's great freshman squad are: St. Clair and Alston, backfield; Baierl, end; McClosky, guard.

Bill Briner, one of Nick Thiel's lacrosse stars, also reported for drills. Briner played reserve center on the frosh team two years ago. He will try his hand at a backfield spot.

O'Karma and Eppensteiner, performers on last year's junior varsity eleven, donned shorts and cleats for last night's workout, as did Brooks and Lebowitz, upper-class candidates for the squad.

Marty McAndrews, frosh coach, was more than successful. Twenty-three freshman candidates reported to him—including one bewildered hopeful who reported for equipment at the power house.

Netmen Schedule Faculty, Navy

Two additional post-season matches have been scheduled for the varsity Lion net team, it was announced yesterday by Coach Ted Roethke.

Tomorrow the squad will play its postponed contest with the Naval Reserve Officers. Originally slated for June 27, the game was rained out, and several attempts were made to re-schedule it before it was finally set for tomorrow. The teams will meet on the varsity courts at 4 p. m.

Saturday the Roethkemen will meet the faculty in a special return match on the varsity courts at 2 p. m. They defeated the latter by a 10 to 5 score in their first meeting July 12.

The team closed its regular summer schedule Saturday with a brilliant 8-1 victory over a favored Cornell University squad. The win was their first court victory over Cornell since the two squads began their court series. The Lions had dropped three decisions to Colgate and one to Cornell earlier in the season.

Bob Neyland, former coach at the University of Tennessee, to play on the Army All-Star squad, along with 34 other former college football stars, during the forthcoming season. Smaltz, one-half of the famous Smaltz to Krouse passing combination, is now stationed at Fort Eustia, Virginia. The Army All-Stars will play eight games with professional teams, the first one is carded with the New York Giants for September 12.

Penn State's Contribution

Big Bill Smaltz, former Lion pigskin passer par excellence, has been selected by Col. Bob Neyland as one of the service grid stars to play with the Army All-Star squad. Also being considered is diminutive Pepper Petrella. All Army men chosen will go to New Haven, Conn., where the team will be whipped into shape. This is one of the additions to the regular pigskin campaign that promises to make football this fall as big if not bigger than in normal times.
