Higgins Comments About 17 In Army

"... If we could have those huskies back, nothing in the East could stop us this year," football coach Bob Higgins has been reminiscing quite frequently during recent weeks.

"Seeing as how I can't have them here this Fall, I would like to imagine those 17 all in one platoon—that would be as tough an outfit that ever donned Army khaki," the Hig recently quipped.

"Here I am worrying about tackles, and a few months ago I had eight real goliaths," Hig pointed out. "The Army got Blaslole and Clarence Smith, both were from Marty's last year's freshman squad and very promising varsity material. Halpin and Brosky are also toting guns, and Barney Foltz had to withdraw from school when his brother was killed in the Philippines."

Rywak, another of McAndrew's 1941 stars; Jim Bonham and Ted Kratzke, two top-flight, speedy guards have also answered the call of their draft boards.

Potential varsity material at center took a severe beating with the withdrawal of Cackovic, former all-state scholastic center, and pivotman on the 1941 frosh team. Paul Weaver, quarterback, is with the Marines, and Harry Alston and Moody withdrew from school.

In case it hasn't been mentioned—the Hig also lost about six outstanding players by graduation.

Dick Stephens and Bill Swan, co-captains and top ranking players on the Penn State varsity golf outfit, will meet Johnny Musser, assistant pro at the College course, and Ken Rutherford, pro at Centre Hills Country Club.

Stephens and Swan have just completed with the golf team one of the most successful seasons in

the history of the sport at Penn State, losing only one scheduled match during the entire Spring and Summer season.

As individuals, the co-captains each lost only one match, both best ball, and both on the 20th hole, indicating to some extent the skill of the boys with their clubs. Neither Stephens nor Swan have shot over 72 on the home course during the past season.

Stephen's best for the year was a two-under-par 67, while Swan several times hit a 69 for a par score. Dick has lost only one match during his intercollegiate career,

and that to a man on his own home course at Hamilton, N. Y.

Johnny Musser has been playing on the College course for years, and is at present trying to crack the course record, a 65 shot some years ago.

Son of the College golf coach, and brother to the freshman mentor, Ken Rutherford comes from a family of linksmen, and is now the pro at Centre Hills. Stephens said that Ken is a swell fellow and tops as a golfer.

No admission will be charged for the match, and students and public are invited.
