

More than 10,000 radio specialists will be drawn from among Pennsylvania recruits during the coming year, the Army disclosed yesterday.

Lieut. Michael D. Murray, public relations officer at the New. Cumberland reception center. stated that recruits selected for specialist training will serve in the Signal Corps, or engage in communications duties with the Army Air Forces, the Armored Force, Artillery, or the Infantry.
