

Players Enter 26th Production Year With Program Of 4 Shows For Season

As they go into their 26th year of production, the Penn State Players, "The oldest dramatic organization on campus," will present four plays for the Fall and Winter semesters, according to Frank S. Neusbaum, associate professor of dramatics and director of plays.

For their first show, to be given the combined Alumni and Dad's Day weekend, the Players have chosen the riotous stage and movie comedy, "The Man Who Came To Dinner." The December show will be Ibsen's "Ghosts," while Rose Franken's magnificent stage triumph "Claudia" will be produced in February. The last play

will be an old-fashioned melodrama sometime in April; chosen because of the success of "The Streets Of New York" produced two seasons ago.

Professor Neusbaum stressed that no experience is needed to try out for Players' shows. Freshmen will be eligible to compete for parts in "The Man Who Came To Dinner;" tryouts to be announced at a later date. The dramatic group will hold a shin-orientated for the purpose of acquainting the yearlings with the organization.

Officers of Players, recently re-elected for another term, include: Joanne M. Palmer '43, president, Jeanne C. Esh '43, vice-president, Robert Herrman '44, secretary, Gordon Fiske '43, treasurer, and Eleanor J. Freedman '44, actor's representative.

Players is divided into two membership groups—active and associates. Work on two or even one show leads to an associate membership bid; further work, with the acquiring of a certain amount of points, leads to an active status. "Actives" have the voting privilege and see the shows without cost.

An administrative official stressed the benefits derived from these dances, since they fill the need for new students meeting each other.

Four mixers have been planned for the incoming freshman by WSGA. Two will be held Friday and two Saturday, September 11 and 12. One will be in Rec Hall and the other in the Armory, from 8 to 11 p. m.

Invited to act as hosts and hostesses at the mixers will be ten honorary and hat societies. They are Mortar Board, Cwens, Druids, Friars, Blue Key, Parni Nous, Skull and Bones, Pi Lambda Theta, Ellen H. Richards, and Omicron Nu, Dorothy K. Brunner, WSGA vice president announced last night.

Groups of 100 coeds will be asked to each mixer each night, so that all students will have an opportunity of attending. No upperclassmen will be admitted, except the members of the above societies.

Student counselors will meet with groups of freshmen as listed in the schedule to help them and give advice on campus problems. These meetings are scattered throughout the three-day period, and should be attended since they will give the newcomer an invaluable lift in entering into College life.

Uniforms will be issued to the men in the basement of MacAllister Hall at designated times. All freshmen will be required to take the physical examination given by the College Health Service as part of the admission requirements. Women will be examined in White Hall, the men in the Dispensary in Old Main.

Changes in the schedule in the Freshman Week booklet have been necessitated by the increased enrollment. These revisions will be found on another page of the Daily Collegian.

All freshmen not scheduled for another meeting at 11 o'clock on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday will assemble in the Auditorium for instruction and practice in singing and cheering.

New students are urged to attend Chapel Sunday morning in Schwab Auditorium. Religious activity thereafter is left to the student.

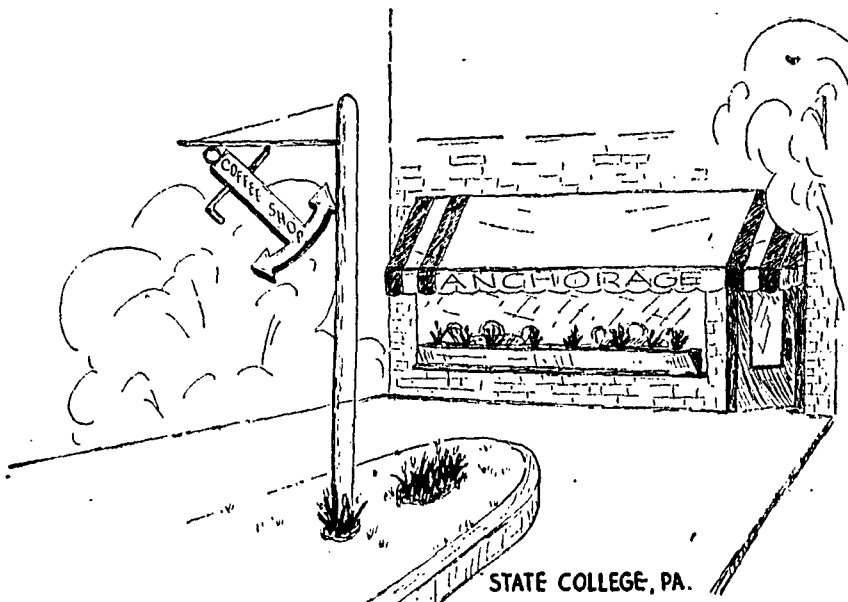
