

Green Ribbons, Name Cards To Appear Thursday Noon; Frosh Curfews Set

"Green ribbons and namecards should be seen en masse at noon Thursday, September 10," Margorie L. Sykes '43, WSGA Judicial chairman announced last night. Miss Sykes specified that the cards should be 3 by 5 inches in size.

"Customs, which include no walking on the grass and holding doors open for upperclass women, will be in effect until Thursday, October 1." Miss Sykes said. "A tug o' war will probably climax the 'wearin' of the green."

Frosh may go without the traditional decorations from 5:30 p. m. Friday until 8 a. m. Monday every weekend, it was pointed out. Special exceptions will be made for certain occasions.

Closing hour for freshmen dormitories until school begins Thursday is 10 p. m., WSGA Senate decided at a meeting Wednesday. Each entering coed will be granted one 11 o'clock permission for one of the mixers scheduled for the first weekend. On the alternate night, frosh may take 9:30 o'clocks.

Following the three week no-dating period, the new class will continue with 9 o'clocks each night, and 10 p. m. and 1 p. m.

will close weekend festivities. WSGA Freshman Council will enforce these customs and violators will be penalized by WSGA's Judicial Committee. The present council will act in an advisory capacity to the new group of hall presidents chosen at the beginning of the new semester.

A freshman Judicial member will automatically become active following her election as sub-chairman of WSGA Freshman Council, Miss Sykes announced. Town coeds are ineligible for the position, it was recently decided by WSGA Senate.

Frosh coeds will be in their rooms during the hours of pop-in night, which date will be decided later, to visit with upper-class women. The following week, frosh will return the calls.

Panhel, IWA Unify Campus Social Life

Supplementing the regular social life of Penn State, two coed organizations, Panhellenic Council and the Independent Women's Association, have been organized to unify campus women's groups.

All coeds are automatically IWA members upon entering the College and remain so until pledging a sorority. There are no dues, and each independent woman has the right to participate in IWA activities.

Established on the campus last Spring, the purpose of the organization is to unify independent women and give them an opportunity to express themselves and participate in activities as a group. Representation on the central council is through a representative of each dormitory group according to the number of independent women in the group. The executive committee is also included in this council.

The IWA Fall activities include a cultural program of dancing classes, informal dances, forums, and lectures on etiquette.

First meeting of IWA in the new semester will be held in the second floor lounge, Old Main, at 8 p. m. Tuesday, September 15. Hazel E. Gassmann '43, president, invites all freshman and transfer coeds to attend.

Panhellenic Council is made up of two representatives of the 14 women's national sororities. Its purpose is to maintain good fraternity and non-fraternity relationships, to cooperate with the College, and to discuss questions of interest to the College and fraternities.

Definite action on Fall semester rushing has not been taken, but sorority women found that Summer rushing proved successful, according to Pauline E. Keller '43, Panhel Council president.

Sorority groups live in houses and suites on the campus, and each group has its own social plans. Intramural sports competition is keen between them, and a dance sponsored by Panhellenic Council is an annual affair.

All freshman and transfer women are eligible for rushing, and all rushing activities are carried on according to the rules of the Panhellenic rushing code.

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
