

### College Golf Course Open Free To Students

One of the best golf courses in this part of the state, the College links with 18 holes, is available for student use at any time except Sunday mornings. At all other times, students may use the course without charge. Par for the course is 69, but is not shot by many players. Most students consider a 40 or 45 good for nine holes. The back nine are somewhat more difficult than the first nine, since the holes are longer and the hazards more plentiful.

# New Class Largest Yet

## Applications Exceed Class Of 1944 Record

"The Class of 1946 will in all probability be the largest yet to matriculate at Penn State," stated Registrar William S. Hoffman last night.

"From present records," he continued, "they will also be the most select group of high school graduates to enter this institution."

The total number of applications on file at the Registrar's office late last week was 2,062. Of this number, 1,438 have been offered admission, of whom 1,258 have already made the ten-dollar payment on their first semester fee.

This figure added to the 571 freshman who matriculated in June, and the number to be enrolled at the undergraduate centers, brings the total to a figure slightly in excess of the former record—that held by the Class of 1944.

Of the number already admitted to the class, 75.4 percent were graduated from the upper two fifths of their high school class. From the present sophomore class, only 72.5 percent were from the upper brackets.

Conversely only 9.4 percent of the incoming frosh were graduated from their high school class on the lower two fifths—138 to be exact—while 14.6 percent of the sophomores wound up in this section.

The Liberal Arts School with 362 enrollees leads all others in the number who have been accepted and have paid their ten dollars. Engineering with 265, Chemistry and Physics with 210; Agriculture with 188; Education with 136; Mineral Industries with 50; and Physical Education and Athletics with 40 enrollees follow in that order. The Undergraduate Centers at Altoona, DuBois, Hazleton, and Schuylkill will have freshman classes totaling 59. Nine students have been accepted in the two-year Agriculture curriculum.

Campus enrollment will take a sudden leap with the 420 frosh lassies that will arrive September 7, and out-of-state enrollment is greater this year than ever before with 280 non-Pennsylvanians accepted.

### Enrollment Changes Freshman Program Watkins Announces

During the 227 years that the College Health Service has been in existence, a change in the aim of the Service has gradually come about, according to Dr. Joseph P. Ritenour, Director of the Health Service for 25 years.

Emphasis is now on trying to prevent illness instead of curing it, Dr. Ritenour said. "Years ago, students would not see their college physician until they were sick. Now we encourage them to come in for a regular checkup," he added.

With a staff of five doctors and 11 nurses, the Dispensary and Infirmary have treated over 48,000 patients during the period from July 1, 1941 to June 30, 1942. These were mostly minor cases, but 5, 239 patients were admitted to the Infirmary, the patients staying an average of 2.8 days.

One function of the College Health Service is to administer the physical examination to all students entering the College. The above figures do not include these numbers. No student has completed the requirements for admission until he has been examined and a record made of his physical condition.

Students pay a fee of \$7.50 per semester for the Health Service. This entitles them to any medical attention that is necessary while in College that is available on the campus. If X-rays are needed in a diagnosis, these are also furnished free.

In addition, the student is examined for sport permits, for admission to branches of the armed

services, and any tests necessary are given.

Hospitalization is provided for serious illnesses, with expert attendants for bedside care. There is no additional charge for the first week of this attention.
