Penn State's activities on the forensic front will get under way for the Fall semester with the announcement by Prof. Joseph F. O'Brien, men's debate coach, that tryouts will be held for upper-classmen and freshmen in 316 Sparks at 7 p. m. Tuesday, Sept. 22.

At this preliminary meeting, the topic will be announced for the tryouts proper to be held in the same place at 7 p. m. Sept. 29, the following week, Professor O'Brien added. Tryouts will consist of five minute speeches by the contestants.

Since this is the second semester of the newly-accelerated school year, debating activities have been going on throughout the Summer, or first semester, and as a consequence, there is a regular squad of debaters still out, the forensic coach said.

4. Approved applications will be sent to Col. Edward D. Ardery, head of the ROTC Department, who will personally interview the candidate and pass upon his qualifications.

5. Students approved by the ROTC head will then be sent to the Dispensary for physical examinations.

6. Upon passing the physical examination applicants will then be enlisted and formally sworn into the Reserve Corps by members of the ROTC Department.

Transfer students will hold the first moonlight hike and overnight cabin party of the semester at the PSCA's lodge at Shingletown Gap, located four miles from State College, Saturday night.

A group, headed by Ruth Williams, cabin party chairman, will leave from the rear of Old Main, 8 p. m. Saturday and will hike to Ralph Watts lodge for the overnight party.

All transfer students are especially urged by Miss Williams to attend. The program will in-

clude a marshmallow roast, games, refreshments, an early morning breakfast, and a worship service in the outdoor chapel Sunday morning.

The Saturday evening party marks the beginning of the fifteenth year of service from the cabin which was completed in the spring of 1927 at a total cost of \$7,800.

Since the idea, first suggested by an ardent nature lover who felt that Penn State should have a cabin in Tussey Mountains easily accessible to the College, led to the development of the 14 acre plot of land, hundreds of students have gone annually to the stone lodge which has gradually become known as a "haven of rest."

Groups can use the lodge for an afternoon or they may stay overnight.

There are various purposes for such lodge retreats—work, social, program planning, committee meetings, and conferences.

Facilities available at the cabin include a lounge, kitchen, dining room, sleeping quarters, and two large fire places.

While the PSCA is willing to cooperate with groups desiring to use the Shingletown Gap retreat, they have established policies that are used in all cases.
