### Phi Sigma Kappa Strong In State And Nation

Phi Sigma Kappa fraternity was founded at the Massachusetts State College in March of 1873. It has spread particularly throughout the East and Midwest until today there are 48 active chapters.

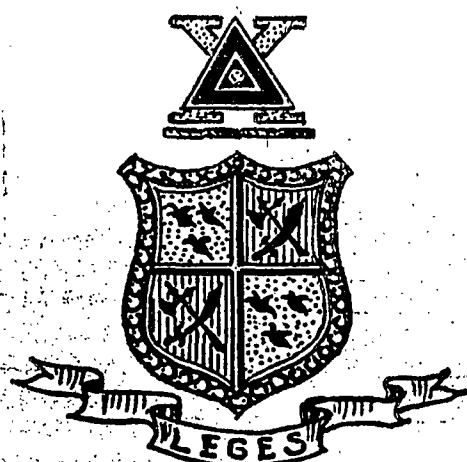
Chartered in 1898, the Penn State Chapter was designated as Kappa, the ninth Phi Sigma Kappa chapter. Kappa's growth has been steady since that time, being forced to enlarge its quarters several times since the founding. The present house at Fairmount and Allen was built in 1927. Probably the outstanding graduate of Kappa is Dick Harlow, famous football coach of Harvard University.

### Chi Phi Oldest Social Fraternity In Existence

Established in 1824, Chi Phi holds the honor of being the oldest social fraternity in existence, and of being rated each year in the top six fraternities by Baird's Manual.

At Penn State, the local Alpha Delta Sigma began a long fight in 1912 to become a chapter of Chi Phi. Finally, through the tireless efforts of former College President Edwin E. Sparks, Alpha Delta Sigma became Alpha Delta of Chi Phi in 1924.
