

'Campus To Camp' Subscription Drive Gains Momentum

PS Club, WSGA, IWA Add Support To Plan

"From the Campus to the camps" the news is beginning to flow, with the campaign to send the Daily Collegian to Penn State men in the armed services really making progress as more and more campus organizations swing into line behind the drive.

Latest groups to give their support to the "campus to the camps" news fund are WSGA, the Penn State Club, and the Independent Women's Association. Many of the administration members have expressed their approval of the idea, and termed it a step in the right direction in helping the service men.

Mainspring of the drive will be contributions solicited from campus organizations to send the Daily Collegian to camps where Penn State men are known to be stationed. Sending the paper to the camps instead of the individual will make it available to greater numbers of soldiers, and at the same time will insure that the effort is not wasted when the man is moved to a new station.

First news "from the campus to the camps" will go out this week when 117 subscriptions will be mailed, paid for by the proceeds of the first Old Main Open House and by individual contributions given that night.

Although the drive is aimed at organizations, individuals who wish to contribute may do so by mailing a check made out to the Daily Collegian, leaders should be addressed to Robert T. Kimmel, in care of D. Ned Linegar, PSCA office. As fast as the money is made available, committee members will select the camps at which most Penn Staters are stationed, and send the Daily Collegian immediately.
