With the Artists' Course program scheduled for Friday evening, Dorothy K. Bruner '44, acting WSGA president, has clarified hours for freshman coeds attending the opera.

Since customs permit a 10 o'clock and 1-o'clock permission to be taken either Friday or Saturday night, coeds who take the 1 o'clock Friday night are not included in this clarification. For freshmen taking a 10 o'clock Friday night, however, Miss Brunner announced the following hours.

In the event that the opera lasts past 10 o'clock, freshmen will be given late permissions. They must present tickets to the checkers when signing out, and show stubs when signing in. Coeds can have dates for the program, and may be walked home. Miss Brunner said, however, that they must come home immediately after the opera is over.

Coeds Get In Line For War-Time Jobs

Wartime manpower shortage has affected women students in more ways than one. If this year's enrollment is a reliable indication, more and more women are taking advantage of the shortage of men to seek training in technical fields.

Industrial, mechanical, chemical, and electrical engineering suddenly appear as nine freshman women's curricula. Hilda Heydt '46 is taking pre-veterinary training, and the College's only woman ceramics student, Betty Utter, is another ambitious freshman.

Upperclasswomen, too, are changing their courses to prepare themselves to take over men's jobs. Agricultural biochemistry, dairy manufacturing, animal husbandry, and entomology are attracting women who realize that these fields offer new possibilities. Eighty-six women are answering the need for chemists and medical technologists. Vivian Burkhardt '43 is majoring in fuel technology.

This trend has as yet influenced only a small minority. But even though liberal artists, home economists, and education majors still constitute the majority, many of them are integrating technical courses, such as radio communications, drafting, and meteorology into their present schedules.

First War Effort Film In Schwab Will Show Targets For Tonight

Cooperating with the United States Office of War Information, the Audio-Visual Aids service of the College is presenting a motion picture entitled "Target For Tonight" in Schwab Auditorium at 7 p. m. tomorrow.

Awarded the International Academy Award, the film has played in over 4,000 theatres throughout the country. "Target For Tonight" is the first in a series of films relating to various phases of the nation's war effort to be presented by the College Audio-Visual Aids Service, designated as a depository for war films by the United States Office of War Information.

The film is an account of an actual air raid by the Bomber Command of the Royal Air Force and includes authentic photographs taken during the flight.

Two war song shorts, "Anchors Aweigh" and "The Caissons Go Rolling Along" will also be included in the program which is open to all students, faculty members, and townspeople. There is no admission charge.

Cwens To Contribute \$5 For Service Subscriptions

Nutrition Exhibit Shows Quota Of Day's Needs

Today's nutrition exhibit, "Foods Make A Difference," will be held in 209 Home Economics from 8 a. m. until 4 p. m. Various foods will be compared graphically, showing the contribution of each type of food toward the day's requirement of a particular nutrient.

Foods that should be eaten daily to make the recommended allowances will be represented in a common factor system. In this manner, an accepted diet can be formulated by the observer for himself.
