

Johnstone Announces 2 Defense Classes In Airplane, Ship Drafting

Qualifications Include Immediate Employment

In view of the demand for women now enrolled in campus defense classes in airplane and ship drafting, arrangements are being made to organize two new classes between October 15 and October 20, according to Prof. B. K. Johnstone, general course director and architecture department head.

Classes will be open to men and women faculty members and townspeople. Only students who will graduate or terminate their college work in August, 1943, will be qualified to take the courses, Professor Johnstone stated.

In reply to coeds who will graduate in May, before the termination of the 36 week's period planned for the courses, Professor Johnstone told applicants that it would be possible to secure positions upon completion of 120 hours rather than the originally planned 200 hours, but that he did not recommend the shortened course.

Only requirement for both the courses in airplane drafting, and ship layout and drafting is that each student be available for immediate employment upon completion of the courses.

The courses are planned primarily for women who now know nothing of drafting or blueprint reading. According to Johnstone, the work will not be easy to the point of being valueless, nor will it be too difficult for students who have made satisfactory records in non-technical curricula.

Seventy letters recommending the courses have been sent to women enrolled in Liberal Arts and in home economics option three. Any other coeds interested in taking advantage of the opportunity for training in a field leading to employment in vital war industries may leave their names and addresses with the librarian in the architecture library on third floor Main Engineering Building, Johnstone stated.

Scheduled for early evening hours according to student preference, six hours of drafting room practice will be held each week.

Only expense for each student will be the cost of a text book, pencil, pen, and eraser. There will be no tuition or fees, and the course will not carry College credit, the director announced.

Miss Frances Greer, a Phi Mu at Louisiana State University, will take part in tomorrow night's performance of "La Boheme." Miss Greer will be the guest of the local chapter.
