Pritchard Sparks Booters To 3-1 Win

Bill Pritchard did it again! Scoring two quick final period goals after a 1-1 first half, the Lion junior inside right, who last week scored three of the seven goals counted against Gettysburg, led Coach Bill Jeffrey's soccermen to their second straight victory, a 3-1 verdict over the Bucknell Bisons on New Beaver Field Saturday afternoon.

Smiley Williams scored early to put the Blue and White in the lead. However, the visitors tied the score in the second period on a freak kick by Eldridge, the Lewisburgians' inside left, that deflected off Captain Hap Freeman past goalie Johnnie Struck.

Play in the third period was confined to a see-saw battle from one end of the field to the other. Both Struck and Reinhardson, goaltender for the Bisons, were credited with many saves as both defenses opened up, affording many chances for both sides at the nets.

Lion superiority became evident in the last quarter. Pritchard's first score was a long, quick kick which just barely slipped by Reinhardson into the corner of the net. The second followed minutes later and was a beautiful piece of team play by Pritchard, Smiley Williams and Jose Lombana, bulwark of the Lion forward line. All three were instrumental in working the ball close to the Orange and Blue goal to set up Pritchard's scoring kick.

Lion Juniors Tie Cornell B Squad

Williams Leads Jayvee Attack

Led by 165-pound Bobby Williams, the Penn State junior varsity football team pushed across two fourth quarter touchdowns Saturday to deadlock the visiting Cornell B team, 19 to 19.

Williams personally accounted for 193 of the 236 yards that the Lion juniors gained. Of this total, 163 of the yards were gained via the air route that found Ed Yorkgitis and Major at the receiving end.

A much heavier Cornell team gained through the Jayvee line almost at will. But a costly fumble and an intercepted pass by Major was enough to give the Lions an even break.

To the confusion of the Jayvees, the Cornell outfit made use of the line shift that Harvard recently used so effectively against Penn. The shift cost the Lions no less than 40 yards on penalties, and directly resulted in one of the three Cornell touchdowns.

The Lion's one conversion was also contributed by Williams on a pass to Major. Two placement tries by Krainyak failed.

Gridders Overpower Engineers, 19-3

After another win over an underrated, less powerful, but scrappy squad, the Nittany Lion football squad last night started preparations for this Saturday's fray with the Cornell "Big Red" with the knowledge that a more impressive display of football talent will have to be staged before they can account for victim number three.

Against Lehigh Saturday, the Lions drove to within 20 yards of their opponents' goal on six different occasions. Only twice were they able to push across touchdowns to contribute to their 19 to 3 victory. A blocked punt and a fumble checked two Lion drives.

At midfield, however, the Lions displayed the hard charging, aggressive play that fans have been expecting from them all along. Led by Bob Weitzel, who starred from his fullback position, the Higginsmen rolled off 18 first downs to 3 for the spunky Engineers.

The opening half of Saturday's fray was almost a repetition of the Bucknell game. The Engineer's drew first blood when Szymakowski's field goal from the 25 yard line split the uprights.

It was not until three minutes before half time that the Lions—by virtue of a 30 yard pass from Joe Colone to Jeff Durkota—were in position to forge ahead.

The Lion's first score came when Colone, in the first play of his varsity career, passed to Durkota who took the ball 20 yards to the four yard line. Banbury pushed across for the touchdown after Durkota reversed for three yards.

Lehigh was still very much in the game until late in the third quarter when Larry Joe took a punt on State's 35 yard line and outran the Engineers for the Lion's second touchdown.

A one-man rampage by Bob Weitzel, who carried the ball for 18, 18, 4, 4, and 7 yards on successive plays, put Lehigh in the hole that enabled Joe to reel off his spectacular run.

For the third touchdown march, the Lion forward wall ripped open the Engineer defense to allow Weitzel to carry on another terrific one-man drive. Weitzel himself carried the ball on a series of five plays from midfield, with the only interruption being a 20 yard pass that he threw to Skuta, reserve wing-back.
