War Makes Room For Coed Drafters; Instruction Begins

Opportunities for women in ship and airplane drafting have rapidly increased in the past few months as manufacturers have been forced to accept women to replace men called for military service.

This is especially true in the ship-building industry in which women have only recently been recognized. Beginning salaries for women in this profession have been estimated at \$45 a week for a 49 hour week.

To meet increased demands for trained women, new airplane and ship drafting courses will be started next week in the Engineering C drafting rooms according to Prof. B. K. Johnstone, head of the architecture department and general supervisor of the courses.

Scheduled to run for 36 weeks, classes will be held 6 hours each week. The courses are being offered primarily for faculty or town women and coeds who will graduate or terminate their college career in August 1943.

An organization meeting for all women interested in taking either course will be held in 107 Main Engineering at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

To date, 24 coeds have signified interest in airplane drafting and only 1 in ship drafting. Minimum enrollment for each section is 15 according to the director.

Stressing interest in ship drafting, Professor Johnstone emphasized that employment in ship building is not necessarily found along the coast but that much ship building is done inland, Pittsburgh being one important center.

Women Pack Biggest Apple Crop; Help Relieve Farm Labor Shortage

Packing "the biggest crop of apples ever harvested at the College orchards" has fallen mostly to women, according to Professors Frank N. Fagan and Roy D. Anthony, pomologists.

Because the draft has taken so many farm laborers away from Centre Country, the women, in a patriotic effort to relieve the serious shortage, have been called upon to do all but the heaviest tasks in packing the crop. Men are performing only the heavier labor of unloading and dumping field crates and removing the filled boxes.

As a result of the women's efforts, an estimated record crop of 38,000 bushels of apples will be packed and will reach the tables of American soldiers, sailors, and civilians the world over, besides being shipped to our allies.

Though the work requires careful checking, only one woman in the whole group has had any previous experience in a packing house.

Standing at various stations along a device which resembles an American assembly line, the women check, pick over, and measure the apples which roll along from a gadget which washes, cleans, and polishes them.

They then measure the fruit by
