Col. Ardery Teaches First CODET Class Basic ROTC Commands

The old Armory took on a feminine touch for the first time yesterday, as over 100 women started preliminary CODET, code organization for drill and emergency training under Col. Edward D. Ardery, professor of military science and tactics.

The major part of yesterday's class was devoted to familiarizing CODETS with basic army commands. Following this, Colonel Ardery divided the group into eight squads of about twelve coeds each. Every squad is made up of a certain number of seniors, juniors, and sophomores and has a senior or graduate student squad leader.

Basic military commands which CODETS should learn as soon as possible include attention or position of the soldier; command rests, such as fall out, rest, at ease, or parade rest; to the rear, march; about face; and fall in, and fall in at close intervals. Explanation of commands can be found in the catalogue, Military Science and Tactics, Colonel Ardery said.
