Attend Stamp Dances

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Air Cadet Examining Board Will Arrive Here Tuesday

Moving quickly to follow the initiative of the Joint Service Board which appeared here day before yesterday, the Harrisburg Aviation Cadet Examining Board—after a lapse of nearly two months—will return to Penn State next Tuesday for a two-day stay.

Again headed by Captain H. S. Engart, the Cadet Examining Board will administer regulation mental examinations for enlistment in the Army Air Force Enlisted Reserve in 401 Old Main both Tuesday and Wednesday.

According to a time schedule for the examinations, released last night by War Service advisor Robert E. Galbraith, candidates may take the examinations from 1 to 4 p. m. and 7 to 10 p. m. Tuesday, and from 8:30 to 11:30 a. m. and 1 to 4 p. m. Wednesday.

Nearly 250 students have already signified their intention of taking the mental test, Galbraith said, and an eleventh hour rush by late applicants may swell the total past the 300 mark by Monday.

Galbraith announced that present members of the ERC who wish to qualify for transfer to the Air Corps are also eligible to take the mental examination Tuesday and Wednesday.

Candidates who have already made preliminary application for enlistment in the Air Corps are urged to have their necessary papers in order prior to the arrival of the Board if possible to facilitate early enlistment in the service.

No final enlistments will be handled by the Board during its stay.

Spivak Band Hired To Play Ball-Prom 'Sweetest Trumpeter', Stardusters Featured

Charlie Spivak, "the man who plays the sweetest trumpet in the world" has been signed to furnish the music for the combined Senior Ball-Junior Prom. November 20, Harry C. Coleman, '44 junior member of the committee, announced yesterday.

The decision to have Spivak play the dance came, Coleman said, after the choice had been narrowed to three bands, Spivak, Jack Teagarden, and Shep Fields. A previous engagement at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology was cancelled when the committee offered more money if he would come here.

He will close an engagement in Boston Thursday, November 19 and come here the next day.

Featured with the band in one of the vocal spots are the well-known "Stardusters," a quartet made up of Curt Burnel, Glen Galyon, Harry Wylder, and June Hutton, sister of the famous Ina Ray Hutton, blonde leader of her own band. Male vocalist is Garry Stevens.

The joint committee for the dance is made up of Thomas Ridge '43 and Jack R. Grey '44 in charge of decorations, William C. Mazzocco '43, defense stamps and stamp corsages, and Coleman, publicity.

After meeting at the Lion Shrine at 7 o'clock, the entire group will parade with the Blue Band to Jordan Fertility Plots. There the football team and Coach Bob Higgins will be introduced to them and will probably make a few comments about the game.

Plans for the affair hit a snag yesterday when College authorities announced that they would not be able to furnish the wood for the fire because of defense restrictions on the use of trucks and gasoline to haul it.

The problem will be solved by tonight, according to Charles H. Ridenour '43, in charge of the event. He said he would find a way to get the wood and get it to the site of the fire rather than ask freshmen to bring it as was suggested by the authorities.

The decision against having freshmen bring the wood was the result of reports of some destruction to property in the borough when the system was practised several years ago.

"In any case," Ridenour added, "We will have a bon fire. We'll find some way to get the wood."

Freshman attendance at the rally will be compulsory. They are instructed to wear the "Beat Colgate" signs which they have been wearing this week.

Because of the small attendance at the first rally of the season, the committee in charge has asked every student who can possibly be at the rally to be there helping make it a success. They also asked that dads and alumni who are in town tonight take part in the affair.

LATE NEWS FLASHES!

WASHINGTON—The Senate voted last night 49-25 to return the proposed Army Camp Prohibition amendment to the Senate Military Committee. It is believed that this action spells doom to the amendment which would have banned the sale of beer in Army canteens.

WASHINGTON—Production Chief Donald Nelson last night predicted that one out of every three Americans will soon be directly working for victory. This includes war workers, Civilian Defense workers, and "farmers for victory."

GENEVA—British planes are reported to have raided northern Italy last night.

VICHY—The quota of French "slave workers" scheduled to leave for work in German plants yesterday, failed to leave. No explanation was given.

MOSCOW—The Soviet midnight communique reported that Russians had repulsed the Nazis in the streets of Stalingrad for the fourth consecutive day. One thousand Germans were reported killed in street fighting.
