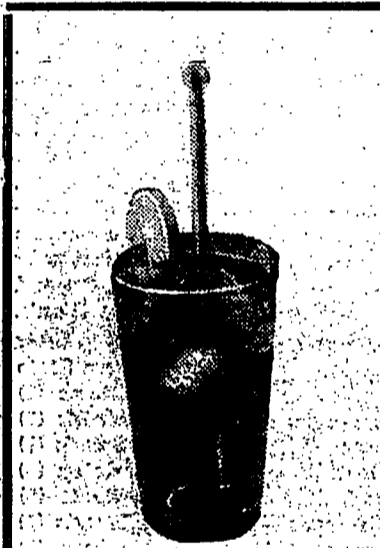

Arisman Comments On Alumni Weekend

Asks Students, Grads For Closer Contact

In an attempt to bring before the students of Penn State the importance of being friendly and hospitable to alumni who return over Alumni-Dad's Weekend, George M. Arisman, president of the Penn State Alumni Association, has issued the following statement.

"Alumni Homecoming Day is intended not only for the alumnus when he may return to State College and find many of his fellow alumni there, but it is the undergraduate's pre-alumnus day as well. The alumnus comes back to the campus because he has sufficient interest in State College as a place to spend one or two days for different purposes. Some come for relaxation—others not only for this, but because they are interested in one thing or another on campus.

CREATE ALUMNI INTEREST

"The undergraduate or pre-alumnus may feel some things are lacking at Penn State, such as a Student Union, field house, suitable art collection, and adequate housing facilities. Perhaps you would like to talk to someone about the vocation you expect to follow later in life. You may think the curriculum needs tuning up. You can get help from the alumnus by creating in him an interest in the things you would like to see at Penn State.

"This can be done without making him feel he should pledge a large sum of money for one purpose or another, or that he should be obligated to give an unusual amount of his time. If you will make an effort to gain his good will by showing your interest in him, you will do much to get things you want on the Penn State campus.

ALUMNI CAN HELP

"Perhaps you think one or another of your professors is not top-notch all the time; perhaps he does not have an adequate income and feels discontent subconsciously at times, which shows in his attitude toward the students. How can this be corrected? A more adequate maintenance fund from the State Legislature will help in some measure to correct this situation.

"The alumnus, the friends of Penn State, and your Dad and Mother can help much to influence the proper people in Harrisburg to allow greater State funds for maintenance purposes. Make the alumnus feel at home, recreate, if necessary, his interest in Penn State through your hospitality and attitude towards him.

AID EACH OTHER

"You will soon find yourself acquainted with someone who will always be your best friend, while you are in college, when you graduate, or following graduation. The alumnus (man or woman) needs your hospitality to make his stay at Penn State an enjoyable one during Alumni Homecoming Weekend. You need his or her good will and help to build a greater Penn State for you while you are in college and for those to follow.

"May I suggest to the alumnus that you make a special effort to show the undergraduate you are willing to meet him half way in doing a greater job for Penn State and take advantage of the hospitality and friendliness he offers to you."

Economic Foundation Announces Second In Radio Debate Series

Second in a series of national intercollegiate radio prize debates has been announced by The American Economics Foundation, Joseph F. O'Brien, associate professor of public speaking, stated yesterday.

The topic of this series' debates is "Should American youth support the re-establishment after the war of competitive enterprise as our dominant economic system?"

Two national championship prizes will be awarded to winners of the debate. The first prize winner will receive a \$1,000 war savings bond and \$250 cash, while the second prize winner will be given a \$500 war bond and \$125 cash.

Also included among the awards are 16 qualifying prizes, eight first prizes of \$50 each and eight second prizes of \$25.
