Cabinet Puts PSCA Farm Group On All-College Plan

Efforts of PSCA members working with Catherine Miller on the Rural Service committee were rewarded during the last week when action was taken by All-College Cabinet to extend the student farm aid program, as started by the CA, on a campus-wide basis.

Though the project started early in the summer, the response did not become noteworthy until the present semester. A large measure of its success is due to the unceasing efforts of the chairman of the committee, Catherine Miller, and the members of her group.

The largest turnout took place two weeks ago on Saturday afternoon. Dressed in hunting shirts, overalls, and old clothing, over 50 men and coeds gathered in back of Old Main awaiting transportation. Because some of the students came without registering, they had to hitch-hike to the farms, since

arrangements had been made for only 25.

Everyone pitched in as soon as they reached the farms and helped dig potatoes and husk corn. On one of the farms where the group worked, they sat down at the edge of a field after a hard afternoon of labor, and ate sandwiches, apples, home-made pickles and drank lemonade which were furnished by the farmer's wife.

Though a few of the girls admitted that their hands were a little sore and that they were tired, all agreed that they had spent a very enjoyable and different afternoon.

Four farms received student help throughout the afternoon. That help was considerable, according to the report of one farmer. "The corn-shucking done by the students today," he said, "would have normally taken me nearly two weeks."

Next Handbook Will Be Different

Plan for next year's student handbook, although not yet complete, will of necessity be different from those in other years. The accelerated program has made possible the use of the 1942-43 book for three freshman classes.

Next semester, which would naturally be a first semester, will call for only a supplement for the '42-'43 book because of a small expected freshman class.

An entirely new book will then be prepared for the next freshman class of any size whenever it enters the College. In case the accelerated program calls for another Summer semester it will be ready for the class that enters next June.

One of the varied activities of the CA, the handbook furnishes freshmen with valuable information about the campus which is compiled in no other place. Known

Open House Series Introduced To Offer Inexpensive Good Times

Old Main Open House was introduced to Penn State for the first time last winter on February 20, when a committee representing ten student organizations offered students a program of fun and recreation at little or no cost.

Ideas for what is now an established institution arose in the social action committee of the PSCA, and was referred to a committee for further action. With the cooperation of Student Union, Penn State Club, Pan-Hel Council, IFC, WSGA, IMA, WRA, PSCA, and the departments of visual education and physical education, an extensive program was arranged.

Included for the first night were old time movies in the Little Theatre, dancing in the former Sandwich Shop, informal games in the first floor lounge. On the second floor, the president's office was opened for visitors, and President Hetzel himself was there for the occasion.

Upstairs, in the Penn State Club room, lounging facilities and recordings were on hand, with community singing in the Hugh Beaver room: On the top floor, arrangements were made for square dancing, and the new game room was dedicated at this session. And to top the whole thing, Old Main's tower was opened for a "view of the metropolis." More than one thousand students and

Name Changed Twice; Reverts To Original

Although it began and continues as the PSCA, the 67-year-old organization has undergone several name changes during this time. The first PSCA was organized in 1895, 40 years after the founding of the College. It was a religious society composed only of men.

In 1897 the PSCA became affiliated with the YMCA and adopted the corresponding name, Young Men's Christian Association. A YWCA was organized in 1912, and the two worked together as separate units until 1932 when they joined forces under the original name, PSCA.

In the last war Dr. Clausen was a chaplain aboard the U. S. S. North Carolina from 1917 to 1919. As an author, preacher and theologian, he has been considered by many as one of the most popular of chapel speakers at the College.

Master of ceremonies of the dinner is Robert S. MacNabb '45, member of PSCA Cabinet and debate manager, Sharpless said.

Singing will be lead by Phillip Thomforde '43, accompanied on the piano by William Fritchman '46. The Honey Boys will furnish special music for the evening.

The importance of supporting the PSCA will be discussed by Miss Jean E. Hershberger '43, president of the PSCA. The faculty point of view in supporting the campaign will be outlined by Professor Marsh White, member of the PSCA Board of Directors, and Chairman of the Senate Committee on Student Welfare.

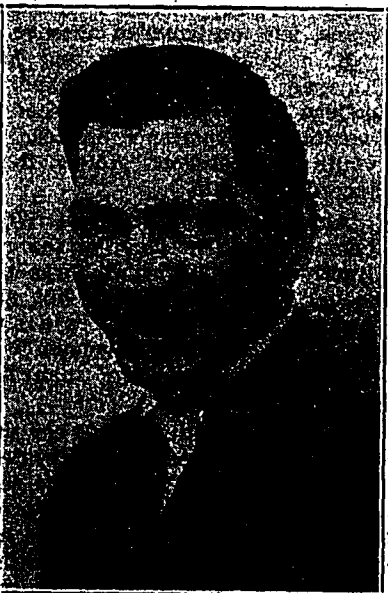
