

# Harriers Meet Orangemen Today

## Stone May Be Out With Pulled Muscle

Students and alumni will have their only chance to see the Penn State cross-country team in action this year when the Lions encounter the Orangemen of Syracuse on the New Beaver Field at 2:30 p.m. today.

Coach Tom Keane and his Syracuse harriers arrived in Bellefonte yesterday afternoon and will be at full strength for the meet in which the Orangemen will be out to avenge last year's 25-30 defeat at the hands of the Blue and White thinclads.

Only question mark in the Lion lair is Curt Stone, star junior runner, who pulled a leg muscle in practice Thursday. Stone did not workout last night, but Coach Chick Werner declared that Stone will probably be in shape to run. **Werner Picks Team**

The seven Nittanymen who will oppose the invaders are Captain Norm Gordon, Curt Stone, Mac Smith, Jerry Karver, Joe Beach, Rufe Williams and Howard Horne.

The entire squad will run but only these seven will be issued numbers and will be eligible to score for the Lions. The remainder of the squad will run a time trial. The outcome will determine who will go to the Michigan State meet at East Lansing, Michigan, next weekend.

Among the strong contenders for places in the Michigan State test are Johnnie McCall, Archie Hyson, Bob Kintigh, and Warren Steubing.

Coach Keane's thinclads are an unknown and untested quantity. They are running their first meet of the season today after a month of training.

### Finish During Half

Outstanding runner for the Orangemen is sophomore Trigony who gave Jerry Karver a chase in last year's frosh meet between the two schools. Captain Johnson and Hine will also be strong contenders for top positions.

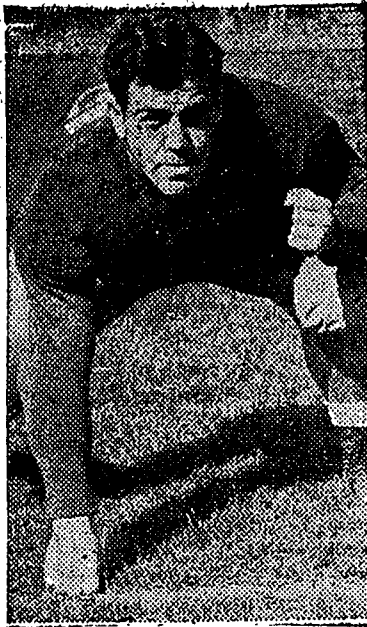

After last week's tie, Penn should come back strong at the expense of Columbia. Next week's Penn-Army game won't be nearly as easy to call. Syracuse and Cornell will once again battle it out. It looks like the Orange by a couple touchdowns.

The Dukes really pulled a quicky last week in their upset of Colgate (they only had sandwiches before the game). But Pitt should be ready for and stop the Blue Devils. If Waynesburg beats West Virginia, the Board of Experts will be ready to tender their resignations.
