

WSGA, WRA Move Women's Meeting To 105 White Hall

Revealing a last minute change in plans for the WRA-WSGA nominations mass meeting at 6:30 tonight, Louise W. Henry '44, elections chairman, stated last night that women students will meet nominees in 105 White Hall instead of 110 Home Economics as was originally announced.

The change was necessary because of another meeting scheduled for 110 Home Economics, Miss Henry said.

Urging all women students to attend the mass meeting, Dorothy K. Brunner '44, acting WSGA president, reminded coeds that although WSGA and WRA have already named candidates, nominations may be made from the floor.

Coeds nominated by the two women's organizations will be introduced at the meeting. Coeds nominating from the floor should name their choice and state her qualifications, Miss Brunner stated, adding that all nominees should stand when their names are announced.

Scholastic qualification for WRA positions is a 1.2 All-College average while that for WSGA positions is a 1.5, Miss Brunner stressed.

Concerning the coming elections, Dean of Women Charlotte E. Ray said "This year's nominating committee has faced an entirely new situation. In many instances, outstanding candidates were either a semester behind or a semester ahead of requirements. Placing the total good of student government first, the committee thought it inadvisable to eliminate valuable nominees for the sake of pre-war technicalities."

Primaries will be held Tuesday, November 3 and elections Thursday, November 5, Miss Brunner revealed recently.

provisions which it may deem ridiculous. Petitions for all candidates must contain a statement of their All-College averages.

Glossy prints suitable for reproduction should accompany petitions of candidates for All-College offices and class offices.

All final nominations must be made Sunday, November 8.

Article V CAMPAIGN

The campaign will open 7 p. m. November 10 with an All-College mass meeting. All candidates are required to be in possession of their approved petitions before their campaign may be started.

Each party may spend up to \$10 for each class slate and up to \$5 for each candidate for All-College President and Vice-President. The cuts purchased by the All-College Cabinet will be supplied to all parties at no charge.

On or before noon of Tuesday Nov. 10, each party must submit to the chairman of the Elections Committee an estimate of all expenditures. The Committee reserves the right to forbid any type of advertising or campaigning which is considered unfair.

A final official itemized list of expenditures and receipted bills must be submitted to the chairman at 7 p. m. Monday, Nov. 16. The Committee at that time may deal with any violations of these parts of this code which deal with the campaigning as it sees fit.

Article VI ELIGIBILITY TO VOTE

To be eligible to vote, voters must present their matriculation cards which will be checked with the Dean's list procured before elections. Those who have lost their matriculation cards and those who are not listed in student directory may be eligible to vote upon presentation of a note from the Dean's office certifying that they are regularly enrolled undergraduate students. These names will also be checked off the dean's list.

Two-year agriculture students in their first year may vote for sophomore class officers. Two-year agriculture students in their second year may vote for All-College offices only. Other special students will not be eligible to vote.

Students enrolled with senior rating will be permitted to vote for the All-College office only.

The registrar's list shall be official in determining a student's class in College.

Article VII PARTY AFFILIATIONS

Party affiliation, if any, of each candidate will be placed upon the ballot. It is not necessary, however, for each candidate to have a party affiliation.

Typed lists of all voters will be given to party chairmen every hour during voting.

Article VIII VIOLATIONS

Penalties of twenty (20) votes shall be inflicted upon any party or candidate found guilty of each violation of the following:

- 1. Electioneering in Old Main while voting is in progress.
2. Buying of votes.
3. House to house canvassing prior to the stipulated time for campaigning.
4. Destruction of property, such as campaign placards, etc., and and other private or public property.
