Tribunal Orders Paint Removed By Foresters

Penalize Five Frosh Customs Violators

Student Tribunal, acting on the request of All-College Cabinet, after a hearing last night, demanded that the Forestry Society remove all whitewash markings which they placed on campus property advertising Forestry Ball.

John L. Kiernan '43, represented the foresters before Tribunal. Charles H. Ridenour '43, Tribunal chairman, warned Kiernan that unless all the markings are removed from all walks and entrances to buildings by 8 a. m. Wednesday, further action would be taken at Tribunal's next meeting.

The Foresters were charged with breaking an All-College ruling that permission be obtained from the executive board of Cabinet before any painting or whitewashing of campus property would be permitted.

Freshman customs will be lifted Friday night only for freshmen attending Mil Ball, Ridenour stated.

Tribunal penalized five freshmen last night for custom violations. Frosh who received penalties are: Samuel Dickey, Clarence Dunn, Edward Zemprell, Gerald Sacks and Ernest Russell.

College Faculty Polled In New Collegian Survey

In an attempt to aid in the solution of problems faced by faculty as well as student body, the Daily Collegian is currently conducting a poll which will measure faculty opinion upon several of the more timely problems being faced by a college at war.

Carefully selected questions, worded precisely have been compiled by the poll directors, and are being sent to 1200 members of the faculty. All those receiving a Collegian poll are urged to give the questions careful consideration, to fill them out, and return them to the Collegian office in person or by inter-office mail.

Twelve questions are being used with answers weighted in five categories from "strongly approve" to "strongly disapprove" so that an accurate rating of sentiment may be obtained.

75 Sophomores Accepted For Advanced ROTC Training; Campus Patrol Get Commissions As Military Aides

Army Headquarters Makes Appointment

Having been commissioned by the Headquarters of the Service Command, Interior Security Division of the United States Army, members of the Regular Campus Patrol of the College have become auxiliary military police.

Acknowledged by the Internal Security Division on October 24 and received by the College patrol early this week the "Campus Cops" have all the powers designated to auxiliary military police.

Acting as civilian auxiliaries to the military police, the new aides will be used for the purpose of guarding and protecting war materials, key positions, and vital utilities from injury by the enemy. As peace officers they will be able to punish violations of federal laws as well as violations of orders and regulations issued by military authority.

While on duty the patrol will be designated by proper insignia. Having taken the oath of allegiance in usual form, they are now under obedience to any orders issued by the president, as Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy and by his duly authorized officers.

According to George H. Ebert, Chairman of the Committee on Protection, State College is considered one of three critical areas in Centre County.

PSCA Reaches 38.7 Per Cent Of Finance Goal Of \$3,600

Reports turned in by solicitors Tuesday evening show that 38.7 per cent of the PSCA's Finance Cansass goal of \$3,600 had been reached, Clifford M. Painter '45, announced last night.

Cash contributions and pledges from male students totaled \$936, which is slightly more than 39 per cent of the quota set for the Men's Division.

From the report of women solicitors it was estimated that \$453.60 has been contributed by Penn State women.

The goal for men and women combined is \$3,600.

132 Pass Army Air Corps Exams

Approximately 170 students took the preliminary mental examinations for enlistment in the Air Corps during the two-day visit of the Harrisburg Aviation Cadet Examining Board, it was announced last night by War Service Advisor Robert E. Galbraith.

According to figures released yesterday afternoon, 132 of the candidates successfully passed their mental tests and will be formally enlisted in the Air Forces Enlisted Reserve when the examining board returns to the campus.

The Board will make its final visit of the year November 10, 11, and 12. At this time, Captain Engart indicated, the Board will administer mental examinations for new candidates, conduct physicals, and swear in all applicants who have passed their tests and have their qualification papers in order.

Physical examinations for those who passed their entrance tests during the Board's current visit will be continued through this week and next. All applicants must have their birth certificates, minors' releases, letters of recommendation and good standing, and all other required papers properly filled out and notarized prior to the return of the Examining Board.

To clarify a mistake made in the distribution of letters announcing the beginning of the new Penn State Club's dance series, Charles Thompson '43, president, announced that the date set at November 22 was meant to be October 22.

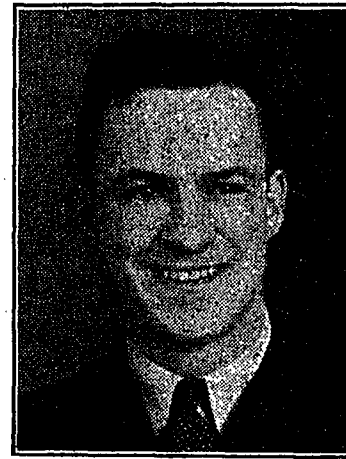
Two lessons have already been given but students interested should attend since they will be given special consideration, Thompson said.
