

### Coeds Vote To Keep Nominations Slate In Spite Of Challenge

Overruling a motion to erase the slate presented by WSGA nominating committee, a majority of the 90 coeds present at last night's pre-elections mass meeting in White Hall voted to accept candidates suggested by the senior committee.

According to Mary L. Casanave '45, who made the motion, "The WSGA nominations committee did not represent a true cross-section of the student body because, according to the WSGA constitution, all senior members of Senate were not on the committee."

"Several nominees were ineligible by the constitution for office. We did not see the need for putting up ineligible coeds when others could have qualified."

Louise M. Fuoss '43, member of WSGA nominating committee, who spoke at the meeting, said, "Members of the committee did not request their positions but were appointed by Dorothy K. Brunner '44, acting WSGA president, at Senate meeting."

"In accordance with a statement issued by Dean of Women Charlotte E. Ray, saying we must place the total good of student government ahead of technicalities in time of war, we felt it was right to nominate capable, experienced candidates who were within a semester of previous requirements."

Only WSGA nominations made from the floor named Virginia Sykes as candidate for freshman senator. There were no additional WRA nominations. Nancy E. Gosper '43, chairman of WSGA nominations committee, announced last night that Ruth Sprague '46, candidate for treasurer, has withdrawn. Rochelle Meisel '46 will run in Miss Sprague's place.
