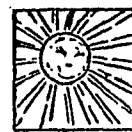

CA Finance Drive Goes Over Quota On Final Day

Men Give \$2,750 Of \$3,752 Collected

"Penn State's Christian Association went over the top in its annual Finance Canvass," Clifford M. Painter '44, CA treasurer, reported last night.

Although all solicitors' reports were not in at 10:30 last night, when the statement was released, more than \$3,752 had either been pledged or contributed by men and women students of the College.

Men Pass Quota

The incomplete reports showed that men students had given \$2,750 which is \$350 over and beyond the \$2,400 quota set for men.

Coeds had yet to reach their \$1,200 goal when the report was released last night. Co-chairmen of the Drive, Gerald B. Maxwell Stein '44, and Miriam L. Zartman '45, both expressed the confidence that complete reports would show that both divisions had met their quotas.

Collegian Urges Return Of Faculty Survey Questionnaire

Faculty and administration members cooperating in The Daily Collegian Attitudes Poll are requested to return their checked questionnaires to the publication office in Carnegie Hall as soon as possible.

As in most surveys, the person answering the poll is asked to interpret the meaning of the questions and the definition of some terms in his own mind. Usual meaning is that of the commonly accepted definition. Questions on current problems are worked impartially so that responses may range from "strongly disapprove" to "strongly approve."

Separate opinions will not be disclosed and no reference will be made to individual answers in the poll. The survey is not a referendum, it is merely an effort to determine trends in faculty thinking as they affect students.

Some statements are so worded that the checker may imply references as applying to "all" or "some" faculty members, depending on his individual reasoning. Such wording is designed to result in a higher validity for the entire survey.

Cooperating members of the faculty and administration may return questionnaires through the inter-office mail or leave them in The Daily Collegian office.

Five coeds will pit their strength and skill against five cows from the Penn State herds immediately preceding the showing of all breeds for Grand Championship honors.

Contestants are Margaret Buganich, Mollie Pickering, Hilda Heydt, Verna Rothermel, and Rebecca Way.

Fitting and Judging show will be held this afternoon, climaxing six weeks' work by Ag students entered in the contest. Brushing entrants, trimming hooves, washing animals, and softening hides, were pre-contest duties.

Last night animals were given a light washing and final touch-up, brushings and groomings.

Banquet Follows Contest

Contest winners will be announced at the banquet at 6:30 tonight, in the Methodist Church. Parents and friends of the contestants are invited to attend.

Also to be announced are winners in the Amateur and Professional Dairy Cattle and Dairy Products Judging Contests as well as winners of the Clean Milk Contest which entailed bacteriological and sediment testing. An essay on "Clean Milk Production" which was judged by a committee of Agriculture School faculty members, was included.

Several hundred dollars' worth of merchandise as well as cash and defense bonds, will be distributed to winning contestants by organizations and individuals interested in the dairy industry, Merrill said.

LATE NEWS FLASHES!

WASHINGTON—Secretary of the Navy Knox announced last night that the Japanese fleet has been forced to retire in the Guadalcanal zone, in the first major battle in this South Pacific area. Military observers interpreted this to mean that the first round of this action was won by the Allied forces.

WASHINGTON—A one-half cent increase in the tax on cigarettes, effective after November 1, was announced by the Office of Price Administration. Dealers may charge an extra cent per pack to obtain the tax on single packs sold, the Office stated.
