

Nittany Lion Football Team Seeks 4th Season Win Against Bill Kern's Twice-Beaten Mountaineers Today

Higginsmen Rated Pre-Game Favorites

Coach And Captain Foes

UNIONTOWN, PA., Oct. 30—Unbeaten in their last 10 gridiron encounters, and in quest of their fourth win of the current season, 31 Nittany Lion football players stopped here today enroute to Morgantown, West Virginia. Early tomorrow morning the gridriders will push on the Mountaineer den where they will battle the twice beaten football squad of Coach Bill Kern.

It will be the Homecoming Day for an estimated 15,000 West Virginia alumni, and the Mountaineers boast that they are going to make up for the losses that they suffered at the hands of Boston College and Fordham earlier in the season.

Experts are rating the Lions 8 to 5 favorites. But a Blue and White team has never been able to defeat a Mountaineer squad on a West Virginia gridiron.

With the return of Quentin Barnette, the Mountaineers' great quarterback to the lineup, Coach Bill Kern will be able to start seven men that started against the Lions last year.

The entire backfield of Barnette, Ike Martin, Dick McElwee and Shrader were starters last year when the Lions squeezed through a close 7 to 0 victory.

Benjamin, Mountaineer center, who is rated the best line-backer up in the district, Peelish, veteran guard, and Spelock, rangy end, were also in the lineup at New Beaver Field last Fall.

Lions "Up"

Lacking the offensive punch that has characterized Higgins' teams during the last three seasons, the current crop of Lions are, however, "opportunists" when it comes to scoring.

Realizing that in West Virginia, they have a very formidable opponent, the Lions have been drilling intensively all week for the game. "We're ready," was the consensus among the squad members as they left State College this morning.

Coach Higgins indicated this afternoon that Bobby Williams, whose excellent pass to Cliff St. Clair scored the winning touchdown against Colgate last week, will see plenty of action tomorrow, and when the Lions' ground attack fails to click through the Mountaineers veteran line.

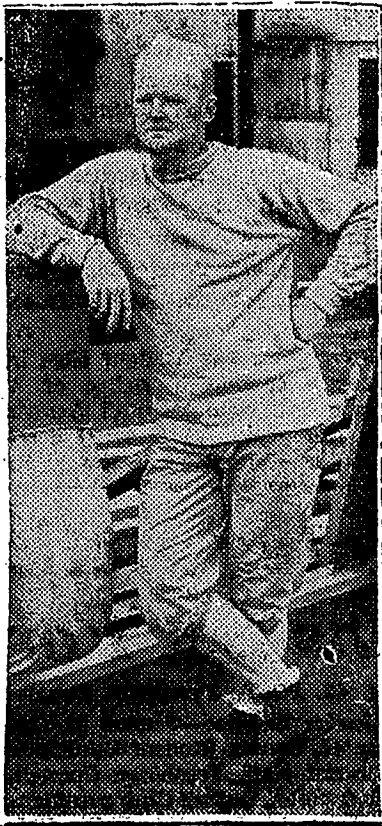
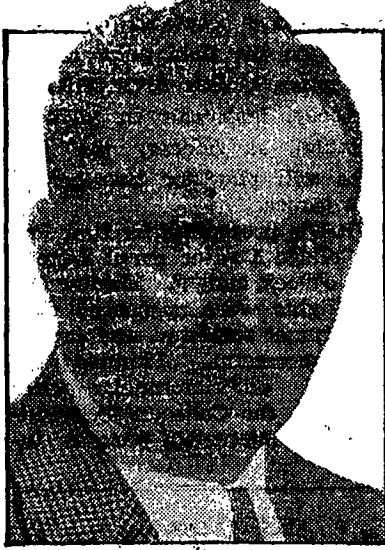
Moore, Walters Start

To take the place of the called-off game the team will engage in an intra-squad tussle on the golf course fields this afternoon. All of this is in preparation of next week's game with the Midshipmen of the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

Boasting victories over Gettysburg, Bucknell, Colgate, Syracuse, and Army, the Lions now have only two more games to go, both away from home. If the Blue and White can get past Navy next week and Temple on November 21st they will hang up their tenth undefeated season in the last eleven years.

Allen Heck, injured veteran fullback, should surely return to action against the Middies. He made the mid-week trip to West Point but did not enter the game. Although he has been kept on the sidelines by a bad leg for the first month of the season.

Top Football Saturday Features Army-Penn, Georgia-Alabama

The 1942 football season hits the crest of the wave today as several hundred college football teams turn into the second and toughest half of their war-time schedules.

The eyes of the football world are turned toward Atlanta today as Alabama's Crimson Tide rolls in to do battle with the University of Georgia. Both elevens are undefeated and will be battling for national as well as sectional honors.

Alabama has turned out another great football machine, reminiscent of the Rose Bowl squad of Dixie Howell and Don Hutson. Frank Thomas has fashioned a defensive line that has given up only one touchdown this season, that in a 21-6 defeat of Mississippi State. Leading the assault of the Georgia "Bulldogs" against the Crimson Tide will be All-American Frankie Sinkwich, spark of Wally Butts' high scoring eleven that has racked up at least 35 points in each of its last four games.

In the East the power-packed Army-Penn clash tops everything in sight with little to choose between the two well-coached, well-manned squads. Syracuse-N. C. Pre-Flight, Pitt-Carnegie Tech, and of course Penn State-W. Virginia will be closely followed by local fans.

In the scrambled Big Ten, undefeated Ohio State will tangle with Wisconsin, frustrated Michigan meets sensational Illinois, and the twice beaten Golden Gophers battle Northwestern.

Louisiana State-Tennessee, Notre Dame-Navy, Stanford-U. C. L. A., and the attempt of Tulsa to keep the nation's only undefeated, untied, and unscored-upon record unsullied, will partially round out a top-notch football Saturday.

State Ranked No. 12 In National Grid Rating

Probably the most favorable rating given the 1942 Penn State football squad appears in the Football News, weekly gridiron paper, in its Azzi-Ratem column credited to William F. Board.

The Nittany Lions are ranked twelfth in the nation with a percentage rating of 75.2 directly behind the University of Tennessee, ahead of such as Illinois, Michigan, Louisiana, and Texas.

According to Werner, the team is in the best of shape and no excuses will be offered if they lose to a veteran home team. The Lion thinclads walked over the course this afternoon, but will do no running until just before the meet which has been set for 11:30 tomorrow morning.

As the lineups stand now, it looks like a race to see which of two "Big Four's" are superior. The Nittanymen have Captain Norm Gordon, Curt Stone, Mac Smith and Jerry Karver—all excellent runners with good records this year.

The Spartans have four equally great distance runners in Ralph Monroe, Bill Scott, Jerry Page, and Horskie. All of these men have had two years of varsity cross-country experience under their belts and should be hard to beat.

This meeting will be the first inter-sectional meet for the Lion harriers since 1940 when this same Michigan State team journeyed to State College and trounced the Wernermen 20-35 despite a first place by Lion Captain Billy Smith.

Only meet of the season for the Spartans ended in disaster when Indiana swamped them 20-37.

On the other hand the invaders have an impressive record of two wins and no defeats in competition with Eastern teams. The Pennsylvanians drubbed Manhattan, 19½-35½, and last week romped over Syracuse, 15-40.
