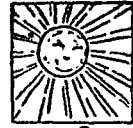

Mitchell, Murphy, Woodland To Head Collegian Boards

Marsh New Ad Chief; Smyser Managing Editor

Paul I. Woodland is the new editor-in-chief of The Daily Collegian for the next term, succeeding Gordon L. Coy '43, who also announced Philip P. Mitchell as business manager, Jane H. Murphy, women's editor, and Richard D. Smyser, managing editor.

On the editorial board, Larry T. Chervenak will be feature editor, Benjamin M. Bailey, sports editor, and Mary Janet Winter, assistant women's editor. All named to new positions are juniors.

Richard E. Marsh will head the Collegian's advertising department, and Kenneth E. Sivitz will be in charge of circulation. Other business staff positions include George J. Cohen, assistant circulation manager; Donald H. Shaner, assistant advertising manager; Jane Ammerman and Esthermae Hartos, women's advertising managers; Eugenia Bundick and Mary Lou Keith, senior secretaries.

Promoted to the senior editorial association board are Milton B. Dolinger, Robert T. Kimmel, Robert E. Kinter, Donald L. G. Fred E. Clever, Richard B. McNaull, Sally L. Hirshberg, and Helen R. Keefauver.

Smyser, as managing editor, takes the place of Herbert J. Zukauskas '43, while Miss Murphy replaces Louise M. Fuoss, '43, women's editor. Leonard E. Bach is the retiring business manager, the position Mitchell will hold, and Philip Jaffe steps from the advertising manager's post for Marsh. Sivitz succeeds Robert E. Edgerly.

Carroll V. Hess and George Paxton are new Grand Champions of fitting and showing dairy cattle respectively, as a result of winning the 21st Annual Dairy Science Exposition held Saturday at the Stock Judging Pavilion, Howard J. Merrill '43, manager of the show, announced yesterday.

The title "Champion Milkmaid of Pennsylvania State College" was conferred on Verna Rothermel, who won the coed milking contest. Pictures of the contest, taken by Mr. Bellville of Philadelphia, will appear in Philadelphia papers.

Prizes were awarded to winners at the banquet at the Methodist Church Saturday night. Presentations of production prizes were made by Merrill and manufacturing prizes by Martin L. Miller.

Before awards were made, an illustrated talk on "Wildlife Conservation" was delivered by Ralph L. Watts, dean emeritus of the School of Agriculture. Toastmaster for the evening was David J. Woods.

Group Will Discuss Planning, Supervision Of Fraternity Dances

AACR Enlistees Must Take Exams

Students who took the mental examination for enlistment in the Army Air Corps Reserve but have not yet taken the physical are urged to do so at their earliest opportunity by War Service Advisor Robert E. Galbraith.

According to Galbraith, candidates have been slow in reporting to the Dispensary for physicals to date, and it is feared that many of them will still not be eligible for enlistment when the Harrisburg Aviation Cadet Examining Board returns to the College November 10, 11, and 12.

The next visit of the Examining Board will be its last under present War Department plans, and will be the final opportunity for Penn State students to enter the Air Corps Reserve at the College. After that candidates must make enlistment through the recruiting offices located in the various cities throughout the state.

Urging students to report for physical examinations as early as possible, Galbraith revealed that appointments may be made through Dr. Dietterich for tests during night hours for those who cannot find sufficient time to report during regular Dispensary hours.

Cabinet Okays Collegian Check-Off Financing Vote

Students Will Approve Plan At Elections

To insure the College of a daily newspaper for the duration, Gordon L. Coy '43, Daily Collegian editor, proposed to All-College Cabinet last night a check-off subscription plan whereby a portion of each semester's fees would be set aside for the Collegian.

Cabinet members were quick to approve of the plan and moved that the question be placed on the ballot at the All-College Election, November 16, 17, and 18, for the student body's approval. After this, the system will have to be sanctioned by the College Board of Trustees following which it will be put into effect beginning next semester.

Under this plan, each student would be an automatic subscriber and delivery would be handled at campus and downtown pick-up stations, thereby ironing out recent circulation difficulties, Coy explained.

Nothing new in the way of college newspaper financing, this plan has worked at Penn, Pitt, Illinois, Wisconsin, all of the large California colleges, and at numerous other large and small colleges.

The Collegian Board of Directors, including administrative and faculty executives, reported Friday that increase in fees for the January payment would probably amount to \$1.16. However, they

LATE NEWS FLASHES!

NEW GUINEA—MacArthur's Australian troops have captured Kokoda, the vital Kokodan airfield, it was announced.

GERMANY—Rommel's headquarters announced that the British Eighth Army has broken through Axis fortifications. Australian troops are driving to the Mediterranean Sea and Allied planes are giving strong support to land forces, the statement continued.

WASHINGTON—American forces are gaining in the Guadalcanal zone, the Navy Department announced. The Japanese fleet has been forced to retire and within the last 24 hours, 27 enemy ships have been sunk or damaged. The American Air Force is laying a heavy barrage to keep supply lines open.
