

## Navy Hockey Team Defeats Army 5-1 In Second Battle

Minus their star goalie and a left wing, the Army hockey team bowed to a hard-playing Navy team 5-1, in the second game of the annual series on Holmes Field last night. First game, played Monday, resulted in a 4-4 tie.

Skip Scrivanich, veteran Army goalkeeper, and Dorcas Newcomer, star member of Army's forward line, were absent from the starting line-up, and it was not until after 15 minutes of the second 25-minute half that Army had a full team on the field.

### ARMY TALLIES FIRST

Playing 9 men against a regulation 11-man Navy team, Army bluelines managed to open the scoring with their only tally of the game. Left inner Lou Schlichter made the goal in the first few minutes after the starting whistle.

For the rest of the first half, play was pretty much over the field and out of bounds, as Army tried desperately to protect its own goal, and keep the game in Navy territory. Right full Annette Keefer staved off Navy scoring thrusts several times before Mottie Haverstick finally hit one in just before the close of the half. Only poor passing and lack of coordination on the part of their forward line prevented Navy from piling up a larger score.

### NAVY NETS THREE

Second half found Navy players cooperating more closely to chalk up three goals in the first ten minutes. Mottie Haverstick accounted for two and Betsy McGee tallied the third. Final goal of the game was Betsy Robinson's Army score made during the last five seconds of play.

Referee for both Army-Navy games was Miss Mildred A. Lucey, instructor in physical education. Third game of the series will be played on Holmes Field at 4 o'clock today.

Colonel Edward D.
