

## Colone To Start In Lion Backfield Against Syracuse

### Banbury Moved To Wingback In Shake-up

Freshmen have figured in the Nittany Lion grid picture to a considerable extent this season in reserve roles, but tomorrow, for the first time in 28 years of Penn State football, a freshman will be in the starting lineup.

After a shake-up of the first string backfield following the West Virginia debacle, Joe Colone, triple-threat fullback, will find himself as the starter at the plunging spot. Jack Banbury, in turn, will move to the wingback spot formerly held by Cliff St. Clair.

In averaging 43 yards for 17 punts so far this season, Colone has eclipsed Cenci's punting achievements, and is making a strong bid for national ranking in the kicking department. As a passer, Colone has no peer on the Lion squad, except little Bobby Williams.

The only other new face in the Lion line-up that will face Syracuse tomorrow is Leo Nobile who will be playing at the left guard position in place of the injured Bob Perugini.

#### Mirabito at Quarter

The Orangemen will also sport a change of personnel in the backfield. Sal "Toots" Mirabito has been switched from his regular fullback position to the quarterback slot to replace Ed Fox, veteran signal caller, who was injured last week.

Larry Ellis, a sophomore, will take over the plunging duties vacated by Mirabito.

#### Orangemen Use "Y"

Despite the fact that the football rules committee outlawed the reverse center—the main feature of Solom's "Y" formation last year—the Orangemen are again working from the Y with the center playing in the orthodox manner. Working from the Y—which might be termed "a modified T-formation with an unbalanced line"—the Orangemen have tallied 115 points against five collegiate foes this Fall.

Solom will bring his squad to Lock Haven today, where they will hold a short practice session this afternoon. The invaders will remain in Lock Haven over night, before coming on to State College late tomorrow morning.

## College Debaters Meet Pittsburgh Twice

Three varsity debaters will leave today for Pittsburgh where they will engage the University of Pittsburgh squad in a symposium on "Problems of the Peace."

Morris Beck '43, Milton Bergstein '44, and Earl R. Booser '43 will represent the College in the two discussions scheduled for 2:30 p. m. today and 10:30 a. m. tomorrow; the latter of which will be witnessed by an assembly of high school debaters and coaches from western Pennsylvania.

Penn State's cross-country squad will do most of its practicing on the Centre-Hills Golf Club turf from now until the end of the season, Coach Chick Werner declared last night.

Werner stated that the Centre Hills course is much more like the Van Cortlandt Park course in New York City, on which the IC4-A meet will be run on November 16.

The longer slopes and rougher terrain of the Centre Hills course will condition the runners for what they will be up against when they take the field on the sixteenth, opposed by the best thinclad teams of the East.

New York University's cross-country team, which took third place in the IC4-A meet last year, served notice on its Eastern opponents that they will be strong contenders for top honors in the annual meet.

In an intra-New York City meet of collegiate harrier teams, the Violets overwhelmed all opposition by grabbing first, second, fourth, sixth and seventh places in the test where 40 runners competed. Manhattan was second.

## Soccermen Embark This Morning For Middy Game; At Full Strength

### Team To Be Housed In Bancroft Hall

#### Owl Game Switched

Date of the Penn State-Temple soccer game has been switched to November 28, according to an announcement by Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics, last night.

Originally set for November 21, the contest will take place one week later in Philadelphia. The postponement gives the Lions three weeks to prepare for the tussle. After this Saturday's game at Annapolis, the booters have no further game scheduled before the tilt with the Owls.

At full strength for one of the few times this season, Coach Bill Jeffrey and the Penn State soccer team, 16 strong, leave this morning at 11 o'clock for Annapolis where tomorrow afternoon they take on Navy in their next-to-last game of the season.

Traveling to Maryland by train will be Johnnie Struck and Bob Seavy, goal; Bill Deitrich, Allen Heck, Captain Hap Freeman, fullbacks; Sammy Schnure, Boyd Eiters, Dean Hartman, Bobbie Fast, halfbacks; and Smiley Williams, Jose Lombana, Walt Wozalk, Bill Prichard, Paul Bender, Don Rider, and Charley Lischer, forwards.

Seavy is making his first away trip with the team while Heck was present at the Syracuse and Army games but did not see action. Don Rider, only frosh in the varsity lineup, will be serving in his third game with the varsity.

The booters will be housed tonight in Bancroft Hall, massive dormitory for the Midshipmen. Tomorrow's game is scheduled for 2 p. m. and immediately afterward the Blue and White will board a train for Baltimore, where they will spend the night at the Lord Baltimore Hotel.

#### "It'll Be Tough"—Jeffrey

Although Coach Jeffrey would make no comment on the game other than "it'll be a tough one," the Lions should go into the game the favorite. If they can beat the Middies, the Temple game, which has been postponed until November 28, will be the only remaining obstacle in the way of another undefeated season, their 10th in the last 11 seasons.

The Jeffrey men will also be out to add game number eight to their new undefeated streak which began last year after the loss at West Point, the first in ten years.

#### Rival Coaches Are Old Friends

Middy Coach Tom Taylor and Coach Jeffrey will renew an old friendship on the soccer field, tomorrow. In each of the 17 years that Coach Bill has been guiding the local booters, the Blue and Gold has been an annual opponent. Taylor has coached the Navy for the past 25 years.

At one of the Navy fullback spots will be Midshipman Jack Keller, now in his third and final year at the Academy, who started out on his soccer career at the State College High School and played first string fullback with the 1939 Penn State freshman squad.

## Betas Defeat Tekes To Tie AGR For Bowling League Lead

Beta Theta Pi, led by Tim Giles, fought its way to a tie for first place in the Fraternity Bowling League last night by taking three close games from Tau Kappa Epsilon, 765-704, 775-692, 875-792. Giles won high scoring honors for the game and the evening with a total of 556 pins. His high game of 213 made him the top man of the meet. Best for the losing Tekes were Stu Kines and Jack McKee.

Alpha Gamma Rho lost its chance to stay out in front of the Betas by losing the last game of its meet to Acacia. The AGR's did, however, win the first two games to stay in a tie for the lead. George Pringle was high scorer. Game totals were 664-634, 621-575, 506-638.

In the only other game, Delta Tau Delta defeated Alpha Sigma Phi 699-560, 621-575, 638-506. Chuck Ziegler led the Deltas with a 430 total, while Gordon was the best for the Alpha Sigs with 437.
