Galbraith Warns Army Air Corps, V-7 Lists Close

Students Must Travel To Harrisburg or Altoona

All students who desire to take the mental examination for enlistment in the Army Air Forces next week or who are interested in the Navy V-7 program should file their names and obtain application papers by noon today in Room 243 Sparks, War Service Advisor Robert E. Galbraith has announced.

Galbraith stressed that when the Harrisburg Aviation Cadet Examining Board and the Philadelphia Naval Reserve Board for V-7 come this week, it will be for the last time. After that he said, students will have to travel to Harrisburg or Altoona to enlist in the Army Air Forces and to Philadelphia or Pittsburgh for the Naval Reserves.

Examinations for the Army Air Force Flight Crews will be held Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and if necessary Friday of next week in Rooms 401 and 410 Old Main. The first examination will be given at 8 o'clock in the mornings, another at 1 p. m., and if necessary, another in the evenings.

The Naval Reserve Board for V-7 will visit the campus next Tuesday and Wednesday. The Board will meet in 302 and 305 Old Main from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. both days. Those eligible for the Navy V-7 are all juniors and seniors, and second semester sophomores who will complete

Pre-Induction Course Planned To 'Polish Up' Potential Selectees

Penn State's potential selectees will have an opportunity to be recognized as officer material by standing out in the ranks, stated Millard T. Bunnell, co-ordinator of the pre-induction course which starts Tuesday evening.

The first impression is the one that counts, Mr. Bunnell pointed out. The ability to follow commands intelligently, handle a rifle properly, and respond promptly to military discipline will serve as an officer's calling card when promotion time comes around, he continued.

The course is not meant to review basic ROTC training, but to "polish up" rough edges of fundamental military principles. Registration for the course will be held in Rooms 1, 2, and 3 Carnegie Hall from 6:30 to 8:30 p. m. Monday. A supply fee of one dollar is payable at registration, Mr. Bunnell added.

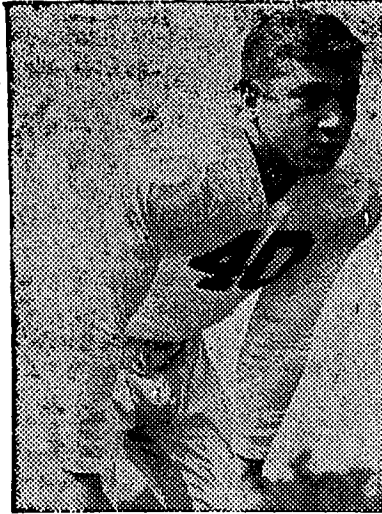

Colone, Nobile Break Into Higgins' Lineup

With the responsibility of an undefeated record no longer with them, a revamped Nittany Lion football eleven will take to the field this afternoon against the unbeaten-in-intercollegiate competition Syracuse gridiron machine.

Although the current season was spoiled for the Lions when they fell before the onslaught of West Virginia last Saturday, the Lions still have one record to protect. Invading teams have failed to defeat a Higgins' coached eleven in any of the last 15 games—a streak that dates back to the 1939 season.

Rated as the under-dogs for the first time this season, the Blue and White will have two positions manned by players who possessed reserve status until this week.

Joe Colone, freshman triple-threat, will move into the starting plunging post vacated by Jack Banbury when Ban took over the blocking back chores of Cliff St. Clair at the wingback position.

Another former replacement, sophomore Leo Nobile, has been promoted to a first-string role to fill the left guard position of injured Bob Perugini.

Another set-back to the Lions' not-too-potent attack was realized last night when it was learned that Bob Weitzel, reserve fullback, will not be able to play today. Bob suffered a separated shoulder in a mid-week scrimmage.

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Convention Adds Two Attractions

Penn State's Blue Band and cheerleaders added assurance yesterday that Tuesday's political convention would be a success, by agreeing to appear at the "big-time" rally that will officially open the All-College political campaign.

Feature of the convention, which is being patterned after national political gatherings, will be the initial announcement of final nominations of all six political cliques. Final nominations must be made Sunday evening, according to the official Elections code.

Party platforms, petitions, and pictures of candidates are due at Student Union by Tuesday noon, Donald W. Davis '43, Elections Committee chairman, reminded yesterday.

The All-College average of each candidate must appear on his petitions.

LATE NEWS FLASHES!

WASHINGTON — All wages under \$5,000 a year have been frozen as of September 15, it was announced last night by the Office of Price Administration. Wages in this group may be increased now only in exceptional cases.

MOSCOW — Stalin, in an order of the day, told his troops last night that 8,000,000 Axis troops had been put out of action since hostilities began. Speaking on the 25th anniversary of the Soviet Union, Stalin also announced that the Russians would soon begin a large scale offensive against the invaders.

BOWLING GREEN, Ky.—Three Nazi war prisoners, who escaped from a prison train near Nashville, Tenn. several days ago, were recaptured near here yesterday.

CAIRO — British Army Headquarters here announced that in desert fighting yesterday 40,000 Italian troops were killed or captured and another 40,000 were surrounded and at the mercy of the British. In addition two Axis airfields were captured and are being used by the British for bases.
