## AA Committee Meets To Choose Three Candidates

### Final Elections Set For November 23, 24

Nominations for the three student-held Athletic Association offices will be conducted by the AA Nominating committee tomorrow, with elections scheduled to follow November 23 and 24, according to Bernard A. Plesser '43, present AA president.

The nominating committee, consisting of athletic coaches, team captains, and managers will meet on the East balcony of Rec Hall at 4 p. m. tomorrow to select nominees for the posts.

Candidates for the offices of AA president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer must possess all of the following qualifications: an All-College average of 1 or higher, one varsity letter, and status of a second semester junior.

Duties of the president of the Athletic Association include voting for athletic team managers, announcement of election of managers, and representation of the group on All-College Cabinet, Penn State's student governing body.

Vice-president of the AA must fulfill the duties of the president when absent. The secretary-treasurer takes minutes of all meetings and handles finances for the organization.

## Neyhart To Attend Driving Courses

Amos E. Neyhart, administrative head of the Institute of Public Safety, left last night to attend a series of O. C. D. courses in emergency driving throughout New York State. The courses, sponsored by the New York State Office of Civilian Defense, of which Mr. Neyhart is a member, will train instructors for O. C. D. emergency driving courses.

On Thursday, November 5, Mr. Neyhart will appear on the program at Rochester, New York. Tuesday, November 10, he will be in Buffalo, and Tuesday, November 17, Mr. Neyhart will attend a lecture in New York City.

Mr. Neyhart also announced that he will train instructors for O. C. D. emergency driving courses in the Philadelphia area for two weeks beginning November 9.

## Bruman First Speaker Of LA Lecture Series

"Geography and War" will be the subject of the first in a series of five lectures in the 1942-43 season of Liberal Arts lectures.

Dr. Henry J. Bruman of the department of earth sciences will be the speaker in Room 121 Sparks Building, 7:30 p. m. tonight.

All lectures this year will be related to the war and the post-war period, according to George E. Simpson, chairman of the lecture committee.

Announcement of the entire series' lectures, which are open to the general public, will be made soon.

## Pre-Inductees Register

Thirty-two male students registered last night for the College's pre-induction training course, according to Millard T. Bunnell, supervisor of class centers at central extension and coordinator of Student Training for Civilian Defense. Accommodations for 720 students had been planned. The program may be dropped, according to Bunnell, because of lack of interest.

## College Observes Armistice Day With Ceremony

Tribute to all men killed in the service of the United States will be observed tomorrow when cadets in advanced ROTC and the Engineers' band will lead students in the annual Armistice Day event in front of Old Main at 10:50 a. m.

The five-minute ceremony will be held in front of Old Main. First call will be made at 10:50 with the formal ceremony starting five minutes later.

Ten o'clock classes will be dismissed promptly at 10:50 and the following classes will start at 11:10 instead of the usual eleven o'clock.

During the short ceremony the ROTC group will be brought to attention and taps will be sounded. After a minute of silence, the National Anthem will be played by the Engineers' band and the Company will be dismissed.

All cadet officers will wear uniforms for the occasion and all participating in the ceremony are required to wear uniforms, Cadet Colonel Wilbur Van Lenten announced last night.

## Cabinet To Print Penn-Pitt Tags

"Beat Penn" and "Beat Pitt" lapel tags will be printed by All-College Cabinet to boost spirit for Penn State's last two football games.

Tags for the Penn game will be available at Student Union tomorrow morning, according to Robert H. Mawhinney '43 and M. Williams Lundelius '43, in charge of having the tags made and distributed. Those for the Pitt game here, November 21, will be available next week.

Robert S. MacNabb '43 will be the official representative of the College this weekend at the International Student Service Conference in Washington, D. C. Appointed by All-College President Jerome H. Blakeslee '43, MacNabb will attend the sessions Friday, Saturday and Sunday and will report to Cabinet next week.

Army Air Force Enlisted Reserve mental examinations will be given to candidates in 410 Old Main, 8 a. m. and 1 p. m. today, tomorrow and Thursday, War Service Advisor Robert E. Galbraith announced last night.

The Examining Board will also give the exams evenings if necessary. Students unable to take tests at one of the regularly scheduled hours are asked to contact either Professor Galbraith or Captain H. S. Engert who will be in 401 Old Main during the three-day visit.

Men who have not been sworn in, but who qualified for the mental and physical examinations the last time Capt. Engert visited here, are urged to report to the fourth floor office as soon as possible.

Enlistment cards for those who have already taken the oath may be secured today, Galbraith said.

In the event that candidates fail to fill out required papers before the Board leaves Thursday, they will have to go to Harrisburg for the final enlistment steps.

Working with Captain Engert are Capt. E. E. Potzgeb and First Lieut. T. L. Mercer, medical officer of the Board.

Following close on the heels of the Air Force are both the Navy's V-7 Board and the Marine Reserve Corps officials.

Lieut. Daniel Dean will be stationed in 305 Old Main today and tomorrow to interview men interested in the V-7 program offered by the Navy.

## Enlistments In Navy Reserve Will Continue After December 31

"Enlistments in the Navy's V-7, V-1, and V-5 programs will continue indefinitely and will not be stopped December 31," Lieut. Daniel Dean said last night.

Dean, who is on campus to interview students interested in the Navy's V-7 program, stated that he had no orders from the Flight Selection Board to stop enlistments when the Army Enlisted Reserve will curtail theirs.

Interviews for V-7 candidates will start this morning in 305 Old Main and are limited to seniors, juniors, and second semester sophomores.

"Preliminary mental and physical examinations for men desiring to join the V-5 corps are scheduled for Wednesday," Lieut. Dean said.

Final exams for those who qualify will be given in Philadelphia. Expenses to and from Philadelphia are to be paid for by the Navy.

Lieut. Dean urged students to "take this opportunity to enlist in the Navy Reserve while the Board is at the College." He added, "We are here for the convenience of the students, and they should take advantage of the chance while they can."

## Five Candidates Enter Race For IFC President

Five second semester juniors yesterday registered with John A. Jordan '44, chairman of IFC elections committee, as candidates for Interfraternity Council president.

Adding to the "professional" political atmosphere at the convention will be the Blue Band and cheerleaders. Feature of the gathering will be the announcement of All-College and class slates and short "send-off" addresses by all presidential nominees. Donald W. Davis '43, Elections Committee chairman, will round out the convention with an explanation of campaign rules.

Clique chairmen will meet with the Elections Committee in 318 Old Main at 4 o'clock today to draw for speaking positions at the convention and for places on the ballots.

Petitions, campaign plans, pictures of candidates, and party platforms are due at Student Union at noon today.

The All-College political school, compulsory training for all candidates and suggested bill-of-fare for new Cabinet members, will meet for the first time from 7 to 8 p. m. tomorrow. Instructors in student government at the opening session will be Bernard A. Plesser '43, Athletic Association president; David J. McAleer, senior class president; and M. William Lundelius '43, Interfraternity Council head.

The second training session, scheduled for 7 p. m. Thursday, will be under the direction of Charles H. Ridenour '43, Student Tribunal chairman; Robert J. Mawhinney '43, Interclass Finance Board chairman; and Dana K. Merrill '43, Agriculture School Council president.

## LATE NEWS FLASHES!

**LONDON**—With American troops already at the Tunisian border, President Roosevelt has asked the governor of Tunis to allow the Allied forces to pass through this strategic Mediterranean port. Observers say that this may be the spring-board for invasion of Italy.

**LONDON**—Jean Bart, the new French 35,000-ton battleship, is reported lying motionless and burning in the harbor of Algiers due to dive-bomber attacks. As yet the combined French and Italian navies have not appeared for the impending battle, but the Italian Navy was reported sailing West from Toulon.

**WASHINGTON**—President Roosevelt called Laval a Hitler puppet and announced that relations have been broken with Vichy France but reiterated that we will not break relations with the French people.

**LONDON**—Gen. Charles W. Ryder, in charge of American landings, received the surrender of Algiers from the French officials. However, Axis dive-bombers have appeared over the city, inflicting little damage. One was destroyed. The surrender climaxes the battle which started 3 p. m. on Sunday, E. W. T.

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
