

Judicial Will Lift Freshman Customs At 5:45 Tomorrow

Frosh Coeds Will Get Thanksgiving 1 O'Clock

Freshman women will "take it off" beginning at 5:45 tomorrow afternoon according to an announcement last night by Marion C. Dougherty '44, WSGA judicial committee chairman, which permanently lifted freshman dress customs. In addition to removal of ribbons and name cards, Judicial will permit underclass coeds to forego keeping off the grass and opening doors for upperclassmen.

Only freshmen not affected by removal of customs are those whom Judicial has commanded to observe restrictions for an extension period of three weeks because of previous violations.

In addition to the usual removal of customs, Miss Dougherty revealed that WSGA Senate has granted freshman women the privilege of dating off campus until 1 a. m. tomorrow.

Thanksgiving day celebrations for '46 coeds may also include special dating privilege off campus Thursday until 5:30 p. m., Miss Dougherty said. She stressed, however, that this is a special situation and does not signify permanent removal of frosh hour and dating restrictions. Freshman coeds may not date off campus during week days and campus dates must end at 5:30 p. m. Week-end dating is still limited to one 10 o'clock and 1 o'clock.
