

Diener Urges Coeds To Contribute To WSGA House-Frosh Council Drive Funds To Be Divided Among Three Groups

Announcing December 2 as the official opening of the annual Christmas drive sponsored by WSGA House of Representatives and Freshman Council, Patricia Diener '44, speaker of the House, last night urged all coeds to contribute and pointed out the increased importance of charitable measures in a wartime world.

"In times such as these, coeds should realize that a few cents from them might mean real happiness to some one less fortunate," Miss Diener stated.

Beginning December 2, the drive will continue through December 9. Funds collected will be divided among Mrs. Hetzel's emergency loan fund, Mifflin County Child Welfare Fund, and American Women's Hospitals.

Money will be collected by room to room soliciting by presidents of dormitory units, and tentative plans are made for placement of boxes at Student Union and in the Corner Room, Miss Diener said.

Committee in charge of the drive includes Kathryn M. Hibbard '45, chairman, Frances Ann Brown '44, and Ruth Posner '45.

Miss Hibbard explained one use to which the money is put.

"As in former years, a part of this money will be used to provide clothes and other gifts for the foster children of Mifflin County. We are asking coeds to sacrifice a very small amount for such a worthy cause."

Formerly, Mifflin County children were visited by representatives of the College, but due to gas and tire rationing that practice can not be continued this year, Miss Hibbard said.

Began in 1926, the Christmas charity netted \$250.60 in 1940 and \$127.80 last year, the House speaker revealed.

Anderson Reports On National Panhel Congress Meeting

Mrs. A. K. Anderson, former Panhellenic advisor on campus and recently returned from a special meeting of National Panhellenic Congress at Chicago, spoke to persons attending the City Panhellenic League coffee hour in southeast lounge, Atherton Hall, last night.

Mrs. Anderson reported on the Chicago meeting, where college deans of women and representatives of the armed forces discussed methods of better preparing women to meet wartime responsibilities. Although nothing definite is scheduled, Mrs. Anderson revealed that there is a possibility that training courses of from six months to two years will be offered to equip women to take over jobs in industry formerly held by men.

Mrs. John Vandervort, president of the City Panhellenic League, suggested possibilities of providing new national sororities with chapter rooms. The four sororities affected by such a measure would be Alpha Xi Delta, Kappa Delta, Sigma Delta Tau, and Zeta Tau Alpha.

A plan whereby "stray Greeks" would act as assistants to the deans of women during rushing season was considered. Longer silent periods as a measure to save both time and money were suggested.
