Curtiss-Wright Coeds Will Reside in Watts

More than 125 coeds entering the college to take courses offered by the Curtiss Wright Corporation will arrive in State College on February 1, and will reside in Watts Hall according to Miss Edith J. Melville, assistant dean of women.

Prerequisites for this training include elementary mathematics, and applicants must be second semester seniors who have passed their 18th birthday prior to the date of admissions.

The candidates, to be known as "Cadettes" will be stationed at eight universities throughout the country. They will receive tuition, room and board free, and a salary of \$10 per week from the corporation.

The courses presented will consume two semesters of study which will last five months each and include 30 hours of training weekly.

The first semester will include background material. Applied mechanical drafting, slide rule and shop practice, elementary engineering, physics and mathematics are scheduled for this semester.

The second period involves specialized training in either air-frame or propeller division. Aerodynamics, stress and analysis, orientation and product terminology, electrical currents and systems and production engineering will be stressed in this advanced curricula.

Janet C. Dayton '45, is Molly Warden, whose husband was executed by the Nazis. Madame Orden, the mayo's wife, is played by Verna Sevast, a graduate.

Annie and Joseph, servants to the Ordens, are played by Anna E. Radle '46, and John Dale '45.

Other officers in the play include Captain Benticke, who is played by William E. Reimer '45; Major is played by Douglas R. Peck '45; and James A. McKechnie '45, who enacts the role of Lieutenant Prackle. Robert W. Bruce '45, plays the part of a sergeant, while Richard F. Kidder '46, is corporal.

Alex Morden is played by Alexander Taylor '46. Morden was executed for striking and killing an officer who was compelling him to work.

Will and Tom Anders are enacted by Serell S. Wagner '46 and W. McKay Carson '44. The Anders brothers were forced to flee the country when a member of their family was executed for interfering with Nazi operations in the community.
