

WRA Votes To Buy Bond, Back War Stamp Drive

Carved Oak Chest Holds '95 Memoirs

Presented by the class of '95, the carved oak chest in the Alumni Association office bears a peculiar tradition. At the time of presentation, donors decreed that students may lift the lid, but that the privilege of removing the tray and examining the contents below must be reserved to class members. That request is still respected by students, according to Edward K. Boshman, Alumni executive secretary.

Inside the chest are the first five copies of LaVie, dance programs, photographs, and other memoirs of '95 graduates. Names of all class members, including one woman, are carved on sides and back.

The lid bears the dedication inscription:

The Class of 1895

Loyal and grateful to Penn State Place this, their memory chest in the Alumni Room of Old Main forty years after graduation.

On the front is a stanza of the class hymn, "Traveling to the Better Land," to which music words of the Alma Mater were written by Fred Lewis Pattee, professor emeritus of American literature. Mr. Martin has the original copy of the Alma Mater, written in his home.

Although his home is in Hawley, Pa., Mr. Martin visits the College frequently and is spending the winter at the Nittany Lion Hotel. Graduated in mechanical engineering, he discarded that profession in favor of small scale dairy farming immediately upon graduation.

Another example of Martin's carpentry can be found at the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity, of which he is a member. A carved mantel-piece was presented by him and two other former students on the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Penn State chapter.

The executive board also decided to back the Cwens and Mortar Board war stamp drive by buying \$250 worth of stamps which will be sold at basketball games. The money will be returned to WRA when the drive is completed.

The Open House is being sponsored by the WRA Archery Club, whose president is Florence C. Rothman '44. All Whitehall facilities will be available to coeds and refreshments will be served. Faculty representative at the function will be Barbara Bradshaw, graduate assistant.

Plans were made to provide refreshments at the WRA skating party on Saturday afternoon. A fee of 10 cents per person will be charged. Students who wish to attend should meet at the Duck Pond at 2 p. m. The party is being sponsored by WRA Tennis and Swimming clubs and is co-recreational.

Maybe in 1959 enough coeds will have registered so that the CODET courses could be given. But in 1950, there won't be any need for such registration. Today the courses are needed and consequently the courses are given.

In an effort to entirely suit the program of curricula to the needs of the coeds, correspondence was sent to the War Department and an outline of the preparatory courses for the WAACs and WAVES was sent.

As closely as possible, these qualifications were filled and CODET courses 1 to 7 were set up. To add to their value, the administration offered them with College credit, thinking that if so many people were interested last semester when the courses were offered without credit, surely enrollments would increase now.

As has been reported in the last few issues of the paper, few have seen or desired the values offered in this wartime instruction.

Even though advanced and especially trained persons will be directing and planning programs in their specific courses, coeds fail to realize the benefit which can be derived and therefore have failed to "enlist."

Deadlines for registration have been moved ahead. Any drop-add fees, which ordinarily would have to be paid in the course of taking on the defense schedule, have been cancelled. Yet, enrollments are still just so-so.

If the College were making money out of the proposition; if students were having to take useless courses in peace times; if women were already able to do what further army and navy training will require; then everything would be hunky-dory and the situation would be understandable and expected.

But the College is standing the costs; the courses are designed to fit the times; women need what is being offered; and things aren't in enviable shape.

It's a woman's privilege to change her mind. Let's hope she does it . . . before 1959.
