

SDT Leads Greeks In Stamp Purchase

James Asks Support Of Sorority Women

Martha E. James '45, acting president of Panhellenic Council, urges all sororities to cooperate in the Defense Stamp drive which went into effect last semester. Sororities whose membership was cut by graduation may change quotas by reporting the change to Student Union.

Sigma Delta Tau leads sororities with the purchase of \$36.25 worth of stamps, followed by Alpha Epsilon Phi with \$30.75. Delta Gamma has third rating with \$25.40 followed closely by Zeta Tau Alpha with \$25.30.

Chi Omega has contributed \$18.00; Alpha Xi Delta, \$16.00; Kappa Delta, \$15.00; Alpha Omicron Pi, \$13.55; Alpha Chi Omega, \$11.25; Gamma Phi Beta, \$10.50; and Theta Phi Alpha, \$7.50.

Miss James added that some sororities have bought more than the quota assigned them, while others did not meet their pledge.

The Defense Stamp problem will be discussed at the Panhellenic Council meeting in the Alpha Epsilon Phi suite at 7:15 p. m. Tuesday.

It seems to take a war to make men realize the abilities of women. Last night one of the first tangible signs of this breaking down of barriers that have kept coeds from active participation in organizations was realized.

The "Masquerettes," subordinate unit of Thespians, held their first organization meeting last night. Made up of coeds who have participated in three Thespian shows or the equivalent (three defense units equal one show), the Masquerettes aim is to foster cooperation and coordination with Thespians.

Although women have been appearing in the shows for years, they were barred from membership in the organization. The idea for this new group was instigated by dancers Doris Disney and Mildred Johnson, both alumnae now, during the Summer. Thespian members finally gave their approval.

This is one of the first evidences on the campus of women taking the initiative in continuing activities before there is an actual shortage of men—and before organizations are faced with the necessity of closing down for the duration because of a lack of participants able to handle jobs left by men leaving for the service.

The Masquerettes have a great idea here. They are still in their "infancy," but their future looks good. Good luck, kids.

by the different methods. This research project is nationwide scope, and canned foods which have been processed by representative canning companies in the various geographical areas of the country will be tested. Various factors which affect the chemical composition, vitamin content and nutritive value of canned vegetables, fruits, meat, and fish will be studied.

Influences such as variety, time of harvesting, handling, methods of transportation, and ways of processing eventually will receive attention. This work is expected to continue for three to five years.
