Hammond Urges Coeds to Apply For Curtiss-Wright

Ten Months' Course Will Start Feb. 15

Coeds interested in the Curtiss-Wright Aircraft Corporation engineering training course to begin February 15 are again urged to apply for admission, according to Harry P. Hammond, dean of the school of engineering.

Miss Eleanor Tiltord, the company's representative, will be here to interview students next Tuesday in Room 132 Sparks from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Blanks and information may be obtained at Dean Hammond's office, 203 Main Engineering.

Prerequisites for admission include the completion of not less than three semesters of college work and an elementary course in college math. "Any intelligent and conscientious student will fill the requirements," the dean stated.

The course will also be given at Cornell, Purdue, Rensselaer, Northwestern, Iowa State, Minnesota, and the University of Texas.

State coeds will be sent to any one of the above institutions but will not study here, Dean Hammond explained.

Women taking the course will receive tuition, room and board free, and a salary of \$10 per week from the corporation.

Completion of the ten months engineering course will enable coeds to work in the designing division of the company's plants in several sections of the country.

Coeds will attend classes 40 hrs. a week and will have supervised study. Salaries will range from \$130 to \$150 monthly with time and a half for overtime, Dean Hammond added.
