In the past, coeds were allowed to leave the dormitories at 5 a.m. without permission from hostesses. However, following the new WSGA ruling, coeds will be asked not to leave the dormitories without permission before 7 a.m. If coeds are planning an all day hike, expect to catch a bus, or have some other reason, they may go to the hostess a day before and ask for permission
