**Frosh Women Outnumber Men For Fall Semester**

Women students are gaining in numbers as each war year cuts more deeply into the civilian male enrollment at the Pennsylvania State College.

Of 536 first-year students offered admission to the fall semester, 433 are women, according to figures released today by Registrar William S. Hoffman.

The ratio in the present freshman class is approximately three to one in favor of the men.
