Farm Labor Manpower

Nearly 16,000 workers have been placed on farms throughout Pennsylvania this summer to relieve manpower shortages which began in Lancaster and Franklin according to a report from the College Agricultural Service.

Twelve thousands seven hundred had been stationed in farm labor camps and employed up to July 31: however, the number has increased by 3,000 since that census was taken.

A farm labor camp housing 70 women and girls opened in August at Kepler Lodge near Pequea, Lancaster county. At about the itions are now open and a meetsame time, 102 boys, most of them from Philadelphia, arrived at Old State Club room in Old Main at Forge, near Waynesboro, Franklin

The camps will be kept open until November 1.
