WSGA Introduces 19 Senate Candidates To Women Students

Floor Nominations Add Coeds to List

WSGA Senate members introduced 19 coeds to the women's student body last night in the first of a series of mass meetings which will culminate in the election of a new women's student governing body.

Ruth M. Storer, outgoing WSGA president, has issued the following qualifications for nomination: president of the association must have at least a 1.5 All-College average and must have had at least one year of experience on Senate. Candidates for all other offices must have a 1.5 average.

Jeanne Ward, chairman of the WSGA Elections Committee, stated that the primary elections will be held in the first floor lounge, Old Main, from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday with finals rounding out the elections at the same time, same place, Thursday.

These candidates who were selected by WSGA will be supplemented by coeds who were nominated from the floor at the nominations mass meeting last night.

WSGA selections include: president, Patricia Diener and Kathleen M. Osgood; vice president, Doris Funk, Patricia M. Hallberg, and Genevieve Weder; treasurer, Nancy I. Barch, Helen C. Miller, and Gertrude G. Rosen.

Independent Senator nominees are Dorothy Wallace and Mary L. Cassanave.

Coeds who were nominated from the floor include Betty Shenk for treasurer; and Helen Hatton, Nancy Norton, and Elaine Miller for sophomore senator.

950 ASTP Engineers Begin New Semester

ASTP Engineers will return to the campus Monday after a between-semester furlough. A total of 950 trainees will begin the new semester which will continue for 12 weeks.

During the past two weeks 250 additional men have come to the Campus from other training posts to take either Basic or Advanced courses in Engineering. Thirty more are expected this week. Approximately 160 men have left this group for various reasons, primarily for failure to meet ASTP academic standards. The majority of these men returned to their former outfits but will be assigned to a new company when they return to their units.

A new course in Communications is being set up by the College and will be offered to ASTP men this semester. 100 men are taking a Basic course in surveying, according to ASTP statistics.

Basic Engineers are scheduled to remain on Campus for a 36 weeks course which consists of two or three semesters, depending on former training. The advanced courses in Civil, Technical, Electric, and Chemical engineering are scheduled to extend for a two or three semester duration.
