With an excellent script to work from, the cast is entering into the spirit of things with more than a little vigor. Despite constant injunctions to "stay to character, please," from Director Frank Neusbaum and his assistant Doris Lavine, most of the actors' liven up rehearsals with constant add-libs of their own.

As Abbie and Martha Brewster, veteran Players Marion Dougherty and Janet Dayton have their parts as two of the gentlest homicidal maniacs this side of Bellevue well under control.

Though he's still without benefit of make-up and padding, Ray Boyle is working up a thoroughly convincing characterization of the Brewster's mad nephew whose delusion that he is Teddy

Roosevelt prompts him to build locks for the Panama Canal in the cellar of the house.

Gerson Miller and Robert Ziesenheim have caught both the flavor and the dialect of their parts as two of the nonchalant cops who explain that they spend their time collecting toys for the Christmas fund because they can't find any action on their peaceful Brooklyn beat.

Technical crews for "Arsenic" have been organized and will be announced next week. The publicity group under Claire Kohn has already started its campaign, and Rosalind Becker's prop crew expects to begin work shortly.

Mark Warns Drivers Not to Pass Troops

Student and borough motorists who use the campus roads were cautioned today not to pass a column of troops which they overtake.

The warning was issued by Capt. P. A. Mark of the Campus Patrol who pointed out that such action creates a traffic hazard and is an infraction of traffic regulations.

Some motorists have explained, Captain Mark said, that they passed only after an approving signal had been given by an officer with the group.

"This signal should be ignored unless the line or column of troops consists of only one or two groups of men," Captain Mark said. In all other cases, he urged, drivers should follow the line until it stops or until the driver reaches an intersection where he can turn off.

"We are doing all in our power to avoid traffic confusion on the campus," he said, "but the public's cooperation is needed."
