

New Cliques Organize

Cabinet's month-old plan for reorganization of campus political parties resulted in a lopsided balance of power Tuesday night, when participants in the recent no-party elections met to revamp the nuclei of what will be opposing factions in future contests.

Although slip-drawing aimed at providing a reasonably equal division of membership, shifting of personnel from one group to another after lots were cast sent 25 persons to the heavy end of the see-saw with the other team of seven high in the air.

Harry Kern, Cabinet chairman, explained that it was impossible to make final and definite assignments to each clique and expressed the hope that student interest would send enough novices to the first meeting of the groups Tuesday night to offset the present weighting.

The cliques will meet in Old Main at 8 p. m. Tuesday to elect permanent chairman and select names to replace the former Campus and Independent. The room number will be posted on the Old Main bulletin board. Gloria Duerst, and Thomas Guinivan, temporary chairmen, urged all students interested in politics to attend.
