applicants:

1. Must hold a high school or prep school diploma by March 1, 1944, or be enrolled now in college.

2. Must have been born between March 1, 1922, and March 1, 1927, inclusive.

If the applicant passes, he must later meet these additional Army requirements:

1. Height between five feet and six feet six inches.
2. Minimum vision of 20-200 (10 per cent of normal), correctable to 20-40 (half of normal) in each eye.
3. Twenty serviceable teeth, 10 upper and 10 lower.
4. Normal 15-15 hearing.

A 16-passenger, 2-cylinder, mule-driven cart will provide taxi service between Grange Dorm and Rec Hall the night of the Slide Rule Ball, October 9, Walter R. Berg and Richard Delaney, co-chairmen of the dance, announced today.

Transportation will run from 8:30 to 10 o'clock with the fare amounting to ten cents in War Stamps per couple. The co-chairmen made it clear that baggage will be limited to 15 pounds per person, thus eliminating many bulky pocketbooks that would otherwise take up excessive seating space.

The "Mule-power Express," a brainstorm of the Penn State Engineer staff, will stop for pickups at Grange Dorm, Mac Hall, Schwab Auditorium, Sigma Chi House, and Rec Hall.
