

Code To Regulate Candidates, Cliques

 mit nominees or a party platform only after it has filed a complete membership list specifying the official clique chairman and other officers together with the semester of each clique member. This list must be filed at Student Union by 5 p. m. November 2. Additional names may be filed only with the permission of the Elections Committee chairman.

Method of Nomination

Article V—Any regular student meeting the above requirements of scholarship and semester rank will be eligible for nomination of president or treasurer of his respective semester.

To be nominated, a candidate must receive a plurality, i. e., more votes for that particular office than any other candidate, of votes cast by the clique of which he is a recognized member.

The clique chairman will submit the names of all clique nominees, tabulated on a single petition signed by him, to Student Union by 5 p. m. November 2. Glossy prints of each candidate must accompany the nominations petition.

School councils shall hold elections in the manner prescribed by the respective councils. All school councils' elections shall be subject to approval by the Elections Committee.

Methods of Campaigning

Article VI—An amount not exceeding \$15 may be spent by each clique for publicity purposes (purchase of signs, handbills, cards, public announcements.)

This fund shall be collected by the clique and will not be allocated from any College fund.

The Elections Committee will print sufficient official elections posters to notify and remind students of the voting time and candidates. These together with Collegian and clique publicity will be the only permissible type of open publicity.

The committee will meet with candidates at 5 p. m. Wednesday, November 10 to answer any questions and to hear any complaints concerning code violations. They shall meet with candidates again after the closing of the polls and before the counting of votes November 12 when further complaints will be heard.

An itemized expense account must be turned in to Student Union by noon Friday November 12 for the approval of the Elections Committee. This budget must state the method of collection and the amount originally received, together with all clique expenditures. To be considered valid this budget must be signed by the clique chairman and secretary.

The Elections Committee reserves the right to penalize any clique for overexpenditure or use

of the amount for purposes other than those stated above.

Method of Election

Article VII—The candidate receiving a plurality of votes cast for the office shall be elected.

Only clique chairmen may witness the vote counting.

Penalties will be levied by the Elections Committee at a closed session after the hearings.

Eligibility to Vote

Article VIII—An official voting registration will take place October 29 and 30 at the College registration for the Fall semester. Each student shall fill out a form which will be filed by the Elections Committee and used to check off voters. This registration list shall be official.

Any student registering late or who for other reasons has not filled out an official registration card may vote upon presentation of a note from the office of his school stating that he is a regularly enrolled undergraduate and stating the semester in which his college credits rank him. He will then fill out his registration card at the polls, signed by a member of the Elections Committee.

Only undergraduate students will be eligible to vote, i. e., those who pay their own fees.

Students must present matriculation cards at the polls for further identification.

Party Affiliations

Article IX—Party affiliations of each candidate will be placed upon the ballots. It is necessary for each candidate to have a party affiliation.

Typed lists of all voters will be given to clique chairman or clique secretary every hour during voting.

more than 28 or less than 14 voted shall be inflicted upon any clique and candidates found guilty of any of the following violations. Final judgment will be made by the Elections Committee.

1. Electioneering by clique members in any part of Old Main while voting is in progress.
2. Candidates in the Sandwich Shop during voting other than to cast their own ballots.
3. Buying of votes.
4. Destruction or defacing of property, such as campaign placards, etc., and any public or private buildings.
5. Cars to transport voters to the polls.

Voters violating voting ethics, such as voting twice, allowing votes to be bought, voting under false pretenses, etc., shall be dealt with by Student Tribunal.

Emergency Changes

Article XI—Since the Constitution calls for organization of student government at the beginning of each semester rather than at the end of the preceding term, the Elections Committee reserves the right to alter its code in case of emergency after Cabinet has disbanded or before a new Cabinet is formed. Such changes shall be subject to the approval of the deans of men and women and ex-officio members of Cabinet.

4 Journalism Students Win Prizes; 2 Get Honorable Mention In Contest

Smith Fills CA Secretary Post

James T. Smith has been appointed executive secretary of the Penn State Christian Association, filling the vacancy left by the resignation of Harry W. Seamans in July.

Mr. Smith, who comes to Penn State from California, arrived in town last Monday to assume his new duties as head of the PSCA.

The son of a Kansas minister, Mr. Smith has been active in student religious work since his undergraduate days at Kansas Wesleyan University, where he was a member of the YMCA cabinet and president of Epworth Leagues at college.

While at Wesleyan he served as delegate to the Rocky Mountain Student Conference, National Methodist Youth Council, and Central Kansas Conference, and was an assistant to the minister of the University church and assistant dean and manager of a large Epworth League Institute. He was graduated in 1937 with honors.

The following year he entered Yale Divinity School and after three years of extensive study he received a graduate degree in the field of religious leadership in colleges and universities. During his Yale days, Mr. Smith gained practical knowledge in this field through his work with boys at the New Haven YMCA and as associate director of Welcome Hall, a community center for the underprivileged. He also served for a brief period as vocational guidance counselor of the New Haven adult guidance service.

Winners in the student advertising contest, conducted annually by the Interstate Advertising Managers Association for advanced advertising students in journalism at the College, were announced recently at the association's fall meeting in Philadelphia.

First award went to Elaine J. Cox, second award to June G. Baily, third award to Nancy Ann Pagliante, and fourth to William Schabacker.

Elaine D. Gilbert and Richard E. Marsh received honorable mention.

Awards were chosen from more than 20 entries and were for the best advertising presentations, including plans, copy and layout. Recognition to winners was made in the form of certificates of merit with cash prizes of \$25 and \$15 to the first two winners, and \$5 each to the third and fourth winners. The board of judges, headed by David Knipe, advertising manager of the Bethlehem Globe-Times, also included George Steele of the Philadelphia Bulletin, Chauncey Eanes of the Chester Times, Clarence Hess of the Upper Darby News, and Howard Berky of the North Penn Reporter, Lansdale.

Prof. Donald W. Davis, representing the department of journalism, attended the meeting and accepted the awards on behalf of the winning students. The association voted to continue the contest.
