Juniors, totaling 160 men and 287 women, have divided into schools as follows; Agriculture, 24 men, 16 women; Chem-Physics 53 men, 2 women; Education, 7 men, 188 women; Engineering, 55 men, 3 women; Liberal Arts, 11 men, 80 women; Mineral Industries, 8 men; Physical Education, 2 men, 6 women.

Sophomores number 210 men and 467 women, with 15 men and 20 women in Agriculture; 94 men, 27 women in Chem-Physics; 1 man, 145 women in Education; 66 men, 5 women in Engineering; 18 men, 247 women in Liberal Arts; 14 men, 2 women in Mineral Industries; 2 men, 20 women in Physical Education.

Totaling 417 men and 670 women the freshman class has contributed 43 men, 50 women to Agriculture; 147 men, 70 women to Chem-Physics; 3 men, 166 women to Education; 147 men, 8 women to Engineering; 49 men, 346 women to Liberal Arts; 20 men, 4 women to Mineral Industries; 8 men, 26 women to Physical Education.

Other groups include graduate students, 98 men, 42 women; specials, 19 men, 47 women; transition, 10 men, and unclassified, 11 men, and 37 women.

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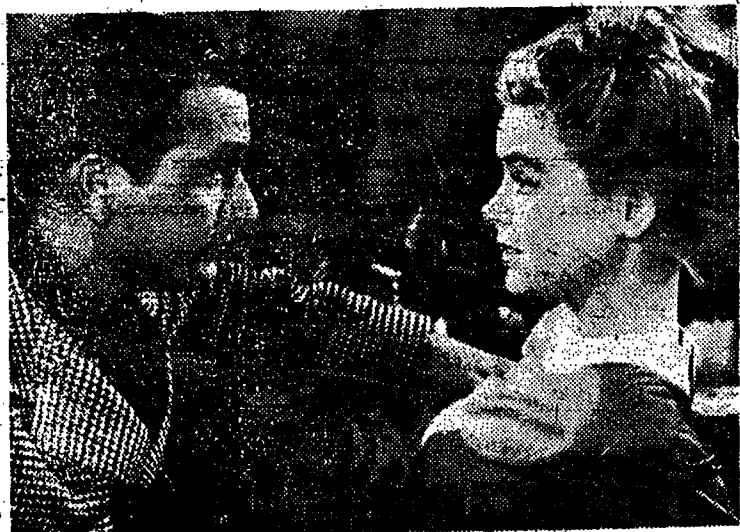
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- ▶ Please do not make unnecessary calls from public telephones during the rush hour . . . 7 to 8 P. M.
